Wild weather has swept across the region in recent weeks, bringing thunderstorms and lightning strikes. High winds, heavy rain, and hail caused trees

Monday's thunderstorms and heavy rain caused flash flooding and havoc in Sydney and across the state. With more rain expected SES are reminding residents to:

- Flash flooding can occur when large downpours occur. Water looks for the path of least resistance and often clogged or subpar roof guttering can allow water to enter your property.
- Never walk ride or drive in floodwater. Avoid creeks, drains and rivers during heavy or sustained rain.
- Call 132 500 if you need the assistance of the NSW SES. The NSW SES conducts emergency temporary repairs and does not negate the need for a qualified tradesperson to attend your home to ensure your home is ready for the next storm.

Hearts on the green: Bungendore to bowl over prostate cancer in memory of a beloved mate

The Bungendore Bowling and Sports Club is busy preparing to host a special fundraiser and awareness event for Australia's leading community-based organisation for prostate cancer research, awareness, and support: the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia.

Scheduled for Saturday, 15 February, the event will honour Chris Randell, a beloved club member who passed away from a six-year battle with metastatic prostate cancer in February 2024 at the age of 69.

Vivien Laycock, the event's organiser and Chris' partner, recalls her husband as a vibrant and caring individual who brought joy to everyone at the club.

"Chris' diagnosis only came about because he had persistent back pain. It was a shock because he had no prior symptoms, and he never considered the possibility of getting prostate cancer," she said.

Chris underwent hormone therapy and six rounds of chemotherapy,

leading to an initial drop in his PSA levels. Despite a promising response to treatment, his PSA levels rose again in 2023.

"After another gruelling round of chemotherapy, Chris passed away on 12 February 2024," she continued

"Even when he was ill, Chris made sure others were looked after and was always a source of encouragement and kindness for club members," Vivien said.

The fundraiser aims to address the pressing need for prostate cancer awareness and research.

Prostate cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in Australia, with an estimated 26,368 men likely to be diagnosed in 2025.

According to data published by the Australian Health Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW), prostate cancer accounts for around 16% of all newly diagnosed cancers.

The local Bungendore Prostate Cancer Support Group will be

present to provide the latest up-to-date information on the disease and

encourage men to prioritise regular PSA checks.

The day will feature a relaxed, social atmosphere, including lunch, a raffle, and opportunities to connect with the community.

The club will charge a small fee for lunch, and any leftovers will be included in the raffle. All proceeds from the event will go to the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia.

"Our focus is to be Australia's leading charity fund for Australianbased prostate cancer research. to protect the health of existing and future generations of men in Australia," the CEO of the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia, Ms Anne Savage, said.

"We also aim to improve the quality of life for Australian men diagnosed with prostate cancer and their families."

According to Bowls Australia, more than 173,000 men aged 60-74 participate in lawn bowls, making the event an ideal platform to spread this critical health message.

"This activity is a great way to remind people that prostate cancer can be silent but deadly. Please, get your PSA checked today," Anne added.



Vivien said the club hoped to raise \$5000.

"Raising that amount would be amazing, but we hope to raise even more, if possible.

"By talking about Chris and his journey, it will hopefully encourage some of our male members to take their health seriously and get checked for prostate cancer."

Donations can be made online through the Bungendore Bowling and Sports Club fundraising page for those unable to attend.

"Whether through participation, donations, or simply spreading the word, the club hopes to impact the fight against prostate cancer significantly," Vivien added.

"Together, please let's honour Chris' memory and bowl over prostate cancer for good."

Unpaid Rates and Land Sales

At the 27 November 2024 meeting, Council agreed to proceed with the sale of land for unpaid rates for eligible properties in the Queanbeyan-Palerang local government area.

The sale of land for unpaid rates is a last resort for Council. All of the properties on the list have a rates and charges debt that is more than five years old, and Council has made repeated attempts to contact overdue ratepayers to arrange payment for the debts

outstanding which collectively total over \$1million.

"We have exhausted all avenues to contact property owners with unpaid rates that have been outstanding for more than five years," said Rebecca Ryan, General Manager.

"Numerous letters have been sent, door knocks have been conducted, and external agencies have been engaged to assist in finding these landowners."

"In an attempt to reach owners or their families, we have published a list of properties in the hope that the community can assist."

Of the original 38 properties, 26 are vacant land, 6 are houses. 3 are units, 2 are other structures and there is one business.

Council is following strict legislative processes, including publishing this list as one of the final steps.

The list was advertised in the NSW Government Gazette on 20 January, the

Canberra Times on 27 January, on Council's website on 28 January and Business Paper Reports; in addition to the Regional Independent and Braidwood Changing Times this week.

As part of this process any proceeds above the unpaid debt will be held in trust and transferred to the owner or their estate following the sale of a property.

"If you recognise someone who may own or have ties to these properties, please let

them know," Rebecca Ryan said.

"We are committed to working with owners to help them resolve their situation and remove properties from the auction list wherever possible.'

"Since the first advertisement was published two properties have been removed from the original list and more owners and family members have been in touch over the last week. It is Council's hope that we can resolve

the outstanding debts before the auction."

The properties are scheduled for public auction from 10am on Friday 2 May at the Queanbeyan Bicentennial Hall, 257 Crawford Street. The auction will be conducted by Ian McNamee and Partners who can be contacted on 6297 5555.



A motorcyclist has died after his bike left the Kings Highway and crashed 20km north-west of Braidwood this morning.

Emergency services were called to the Kings Highway, Manar, about 11:30am on Friday 7 February 2025, and found a 57year-old man was critically injured when his bike struck a pole.

Two passersby rendered assistance; however, he was unable to be revived and died at the scene.

Police District have commenced an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the crash.

Empowering conversations: Youth Mental Health First Aid Course in Bungendore

Anyone can have a conversation that may save a life. Everyone should know how. Action on Youth Mental Health in Bungendore

Every person is likely to know family members, friends, coworkers or community members who are experiencing a mental health problem. In fact, mental illness is now said to affect every Australian either directly or indirectly.

Youth & mental health

Recent data (abc.net.au; abs.gov.au) shows a significant rise in mental health issues among young Australians. Nearly 40% of young people aged 16 to 24 reported experiencing a mental health disorder between 2020 and 2022. This is a substantial increase from 26% in 2007.

Anxiety disorders are the most common, affecting about two in five young women and one in four young men. The impact of COVID-19, social media, and global uncertainties have been major contributing factors.

This demonstrates the need for community-led models of care that empower individuals where they live, work and play.

Understanding how to talk about mental health and having the confidence and knowledge to help someone in need are important skills that any person in the community can learn.



Youth Mental Health First Aid Course

The Youth Mental Health First Aid course teaches participants how to recognise symptoms and provide initial support to a young person (aged 12 - 18) who may be experiencing a mental health problem or mental health crisis, until professional help is received or the crisis resolves.

Course participants learn about the signs and symptoms of common mental health problems in adolescents, how to recognise and respond to an emerging or worsening mental health problem, and the treatments and support available

So what can I do?

The Rotary Club of Bungendore is running the Youth Mental Health Course in Bungendore on 22-23 March 2025.

The course will be run in person over a weekend (2 days) with a cost of \$30 per person which

Bungendore's corner block: a forgotten space or future hub?

For years Bungendore's prominent corner block at Gibraltar and Ellendon Streets has remained a fenced-off space, despite plans and community hopes for its development. Once proposed as a bustling hub with council offices. community facilities, and much-needed public amenities, the site has instead become an eyesore, raising frustration among residents and local business owners. As the years pass with no progress, the community continues to ask for this central location into a space that benefits Bungendore's growing population and many visitors alike

The 2,023m² block at the corner of Gibraltar and Ellendon Streets was privately purchased in 2013, and in mid-2014, a **Development Application** (DA) was approved for commercial, retail, and office spaces. Years later the fences were erected.

In July 2021, Council purchased the site for \$1.43 million, funded by the \$9,727,359.00 Department of Education (DoE) compensation payment, with plans to develop a Council building, community facilities, and a library. More than four years later, the fences remain and could potentially remain for some years to come.

Community Concerns

Alan Longhurst, President of the Bungendore Chamber of Commerce and Industry (BCCI) highlighted longstanding concerns about the vacant "corner block" and its impact on the village streetscape.

"Over the years the Bungendore Chamber of Commerce and Industry has discussed the impact that the vacant "corner block"

has on the streetscape in the village.

"Development of new offices on the Council owned land was seen as an opportunity to activate the corner, create a focal point for village life and provide formal and informal meeting spaces. The design also included provision of public toilets which are sorely needed in this part of town.

"However, we are aware that the replacement Council building proposed for the land may not now proceed."

Businesses, residents, and community groups have long advocated for the revitalisation and use of this

Previous Planning & Community Consultation

In 2008, BCCI prepared a Landscape Master Plan to guide the future streetscape character of the village. The plan was developed through face-to-face interviews and surveys with business owners, along with an interactive public display at the old council chambers.

"The vacant block on the corner of Gibraltar and Ellendon Streets is often suggested as a possible site for a town square.

Minimal infrastructure, using soil to create a turfed amphitheatre with undulated seating, located in the southwest corner, would provide a cool retreat for mothers and children in summer and serve as a performance venue on summer evenings.'

In 2010, the Bungendore Land Use Strategy and Structure Plan was adopted and reaffirmed this vision, based on feedback from business owners and residents, calling for streetscape and footpath improvements.

In 2020, Council adopted the Bungendore Structure Plan 2048, which streetscape plan for the area, incorporating work previously undertaken by Palerang Council.

"Recreation and employment lands are key areas to monitor to ensure this Structure Plan is delivering on its intent and responding to emerging issues and trends.

Including green space and recreational areas will help retain the town's rural character."

The Bungendore Place Plan, adopted in June 2024 after extensive community consultation, emphasised the need for "better maintenance, cleanliness, native vegetation, and additional small green spaces throughout the town

Gibraltar Street is central to Bungendore's identity, valued for its rural charm, historic character, and

community hub role. It is home to a mix of businesses, cafés, pubs, the post office, making it a popular area for leisurely strolls and community interaction.

For years, many businesses and residents have repeatedly called for public toilets at this end of town, as the only existing facilities are located at Bungendore Park.

Public toilets, the fit out for community markets and EV charging stations were included in the original central carpark design (October 2020) but were removed from the design at construction stage.

Preliminary designs for the new council facility (April 2024), included public toilets and EV charging stations. However, with the decision to move back into the old council chambers, these facilities will once again not be built

include:

- Public toilets
- · A mural on the brick wall
- Mature landscaping & large deciduous trees
- · Quality seating and
- A stage for concerts / performances

Before the site was fenced off, many community groups held market days and events there, as the location connected Gibraltar and Ellendon Streets, making it an ideal central gathering

Mr Longhurst expressed frustration at the ongoing neglect of the site:

"The prison-like security fence has been an eyesore for years. We would like to see it removed and the block landscaped for community use while deliberations about its future continue.

annual street party, informal performances, or simply serve as a gathering place with seating and artwork.

"The benefit of retaining accessible open space with street frontage should be valued and considered in any future plans."

The future of this central block is now uncertain. Many locals want to see it retained and revitalised.

Now, is a perfect opportunity for council to engage with the community and renovate the corner block for all to use and enjoy.



QPRC: Revised Draft Solid Fuel heater Policy now open for comment

Understanding the Revised Solid Fuel Heater Policy

Despite significant public opposition, council continues to push forward with a Revised Draft Solid Fuel Heater Policy.

Previous council decisions

August 14, 2024: Councillors discussed the Draft Solid Fuel Heater Policy and amended Point 3.2 to specify that the policy does not apply to replacing existing approved wood heaters.

December 18, 2024: Councillors voted on the Draft Solid Fuel Heater Policy.

Public feedback was overwhelmingly against the policy, with 82.5% of respondents opposing it. Of the 237 submissions received, 191 were against the policy, while 44 supported it.

Council staff recommendations:

- Not adopting the policy at this
- · Receiving a report on further options to restrict solid fuel heaters in specific areas of the Local Government Area (LGA).

Despite staff recommendations, the Council passed the following

- · Review the draft policy to clarify its scope and intent.
- Develop a communications plan to address misunderstandings about the policy.

- Resubmit the policy for public 2010 (such as DA Consents, consultation for 28 days from February 1, 2025.
- Prepare a report on public consultation responses.

For: Crs Livermore, Preston, Taskovski, Willis, Wilson, Waterhouse, and Winchester.

Against: Crs Broadbent, Grundy, Schweikert, and Macdonald.

Key changes in the Revised **Draft Policy**

Outcomes - The phrase "protects" has been changed to "To protect".

Content - The revised policy now states the areas it applies to, whereas the initial draft policy included areas only in the Appendix.

Review Process - A new clause (7.2) was added: "Any review of the policy will require further public consultation before any changes, except where imposed by State or Federal legislation."

Is your current wood fire heater council approved?

To check if your current wood fire heater is council approved.

- 1. Review your approved plans and development consent to see if the heater is listed.
- 2. If you don't have a copy of these documents, you can obtain them through an informal GIPA application at councils
- For property information requests dated before July 1,

Occupation Certificates, plans, etc.), there is now a flat fee of \$500, whether or not any records are found

- For requests dated after July 1, 2010, there is no charge.

If your approved plans do not show a solid fuel heater, and there is no separate approval for the heater's installation under section 68 of the Local Government Act 1993, Council will consider the heater unapproved.

Upgrading your current Wood Fire Heater

If your current heater is not approved, you will need to then apply for approval under Section 68 of the Local Government Act 1993.

If you want to upgrade your wood fire heater to a more efficient model, under this draft policy, you cannot replace it unless your current heater is council approved.

This includes the following four Yes/No questions:

- 1. Existing approved wood heaters do not need to be removed. Do you think this is appropriate?

Revised Draft Solid Fuel Heater **Policy**

After the feedback we received previously during consultation in September and October last year, the policy has been rewritten to be clearer and better explain what the policy applies to.

The policy is seeking to reduce the impacts of wood smoke by limiting the installation of new solid fuel heaters.

This policy restricts the installation of new solid fuel heaters in the urban areas of:

- Queanbeyan (excluding Greenleigh)
- Jerrabomberra
- Googong
- Jumping Creek
- Tralee
- Bungendore township (including Elm Grove Subdivision)
- · Braidwood township (including Braidwood Ridge Subdivision)

Under the policy, existing approved solid fuel heaters do not need to be removed. Existing approved solid fuel heaters can still be replaced with new solid fuel heaters.

RACGP applauds federal governments \$537M women's health package

The Royal Australian College of GPs has applauded the Federal Government's \$573.3 million package for women's health which includes new funding for menopause health assessments and increased funding for long-acting reversible contraception (LARCs).

The Albanese Government package announced today includes more funding for LARC insertion and removal, and to establish LARC training centres. It also includes new funding for menopause health assessments, the development of national guidelines for menopause and perimenopause, and for new generation contraceptive pills to be listed on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS).

RACGP President Dr Michael Wright said: "The RACGP has been calling for more funding for women's health and we applaud the Albanese Government for this package, particularly funding for health assessments and LARCs.

"We know cost-of-living is hitting women hard. Surveys show women are more likely to have delayed seeking essential healthcare due to costs than men. And, on top of this, medical misogyny is embedded in Medicare.

"The current subsidy for Intrauterine Device (IUD) insertion is just \$77, while a vasectomy, which is equally complex and time consuming, gets much more funding at \$222. The RACGP spoke about this issue and the need for more

funding with Health and Aged Care Assistant Minister Ged Kearney just last year.

"Women across Australia need better access to affordable and comprehensive care for health issues like endometriosis, chronic pelvic pain, menopause, and perimenopause.

"New funding for menopause health assessments will immediately improve access to affordable and high-quality care from specialist GPs for those who

"The new generation contraceptive pills being added to the PBS will also give women greater options and choices.

"There is no substitute for the quality care you get from a GP who knows you are your history. Everyone needs affordable access, no matter your gender, income, or where you live in Australia.

"The RACGP has a comprehensive plan for accessible and affordable GP care, which includes a suite of initiatives for women's health, which we'll be releasing next week. As part of this, we have been calling for more funding for LARC insertion, and women's health assessments.

"Better funding women's health including contraceptives and health assessments is an investment that will pay off. It will improve health and wellbeing, reduce pressure on our health system, and help reduce gender bias in our health

They are also known to destroy habitats critical to threatened and endangered species, further endangering local biodiversity.



Investing for your kids future

One of the re-occurring goals I hear are the desire to invest for their kid's future. While the motivations can vary, the common theme is to be able to give them a leg up when they are in their mid-20's.

Here are the five things parents should consider looking at:

Normalise investing

I encourage clients to hold a small amount of investments in their child's name and invest with them. Get them involved. Show them the power of compounding. Show them

that markets go up more than they go down.

The short-term tax consequences of investing like this are far outweighed by the long-term benefit of having a young child that understands investing.

Invest through Super

Quite a few people want to be able to hand over a lump sum to help their kids buy a house or start their own investment journey.

The most tax effective way for anyone to invest is through super. The downside to super is you can't access your super until you meet a condition of release - age wise this is usually at 60.

If the timelines work out, the best way to invest money for your kids is to do it through super. Either through concessional or non-concessional contributions.

Buy investment properties through a Self-Managed Super Fund

Parents are always worried their kids won't be able to afford to get into the property market in the next 20 years.

A solution is to setup a SMSF and use it to buy investment properties. If the timeframes work out, you could then sell this property when you are in pension phase meaning you would then pay no capital gains tax. This money could then be withdrawn and given to your kids.

Invest through Investment

Investment Bonds can be a tax-effective way of investing if you (and your spouse) are both high earners. If the timelines don't match up with super, Investment Bonds should also be considered.

This is a good way to cap the tax paid on your investment earnings at 30%.

Invest through an investment company

If you are a business owner, one of the favoured ways of investing is to do it through an investment company who is a beneficiary of the income generated by your trading company.

The benefit of this is you can pass on profit generated by your trading company and invest the funds before you pay additional tax.

For high income earners where you are paying 47% tax, you will be able to invest at least 17% more than if you paid the money

to yourself, paid tax and then invested what was left.

For business owners, this is

even better than making

Jaspreet (Jas) Kaur, Diabetes Educator at the Queanbeyan Community Health Centre, helps people to take control of their health and thrive, no matter where they are in their diabetes journey.

"Diabetes is a lifelong condition, but with the right tools and support, it's manageable," Jas explains.

"My role is to work with patients to simplify the complexities of diabetes and give them the confidence to make positive changes."

Whether you've been newly diagnosed, are living with diabetes, or are at risk of developing the condition, Southern's Diabetes Services offer a personalised approach to help you manage your health effectively.

One in 11 people aged over 16 years in NSW has diabetes and this number is growing.

A diabetes diagnosis can bring up many questions: What can I eat? How do I control my blood sugar? How will this impact my life longterm? This is where a diabetes educator like Jas comes in.

If you've been putting off seeking help for diabetes or pre-diabetes, now is the time to act. "It's never too late to make a change," Jas encourages.

"Our sessions are about supporting you, not judging you. Together, we'll create a plan that makes sense for your life."

For Jas, her journey to becoming a Diabetes Educator has been about both personal and professional growth.

"Growing up, I watched my father live with diabetes for many years, and seeing the challenges he faced in managing the condition was a key motivator for me to pursue a career in healthcare."

This personal connection sparked a desire to help others navigate similar challenges and manage their conditions more effectively.

"Professionally, my background includes Master of Acute Care Nursing, Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Education. as well as specialised qualifications like a Graduate Certificate in Diabetes Education and Management."

"Over the years, I've worked in various roles, from Registered Nurse in medical, surgical, and rehabilitation settings, to Clinical Nurse Specialist positions, where I managed both acute and chronic conditions."

Many people hesitate to seek help due to misconceptions about diabetes management. Common myths, like "I can't eat carbs" or "diabetes isn't serious if I don't have symptoms," can prevent people from taking action.

Jas is passionate about addressing these misunderstandings. "I provide clear, evidence-based education



to help patients overcome fears and make informed decisions," she explains.

"By addressing these misconceptions, I help individuals not only better manage their diabetes but also feel more in control of their health, reducing anxiety and improving overall outcomes."

The Diabetes Service is open to everyone in the Queanbeyan-Palerang community, with outreach to Bungendore and Braidwood, from individuals with pre-diabetes to those managing diabetes during pregnancy.

Patients can self-refer or be referred by a healthcare provider, making it easy to access the care they need.

Sessions are tailored to each person's unique needs, ensuring you leave with a plan that fits your lifestyle and goals.

"We take the time to understand your challenges and create a roadmap that works for you," Jas says.

"It's completely normal to feel nervous about seeking help, but you're not alone in this journey. Diabetes can be complex, and managing it takes time, patience, and support." "Coming to a session is about empowering yourself with the knowledge and tools to manage your health on your terms, and I'm here to guide you through that process, without judgment."

"You're taking an important step toward feeling better and being in control of your health, and that's something to feel proud of."

Aged care funding changes branded 'lazy'

Most seniors will be paying more for care under the new system and an expert predicts failure.

Seniors who are financially stressed may risk poorer aged care, the withdrawal of aged care providers and the closure of aged care services because of the Federal Government's aged care funding reforms.

The reforms, which are now legislated, aim to cut the taxpayer subsidy of aged care.

The Federal Government projects the reforms will save \$18.88 billion. However, that will be achieved by shifting more costs onto consumers of home and residential care, and by expecting providers to absorb the risk of bad

That threatens the financial viability of many aged care services, particularly smaller, regional providers and community aged care providers who lack the reserves to absorb bad debts, according to aged care expert and Aged Care Royal Commission advisor, Professor Kathy Eagar.

Talking to the HelloCare newsletter, Professor Eagar said the financial burden on providers was "unsustainable".

"The government proposes a massive increase in consumer charges, expecting providers to collect these payments. If consumers cannot pay, providers face the dilemma of delivering unfunded services or ceasing care altogether. This creates a significant financial strain and jeopardises service quality."

She also doubts the government's assumption that older Australians can shoulder increased costs.

"There's a perception that baby boomers are cashed up, but by the time they need aged care, most have depleted their resources," she said.

HelloCare says data supports her claim: only 13% of Australians aged 85 or older have more than \$100,000 in superannuation.

"The reality is that these savings projections are overly optimistic and likely unachievable, Professor Eagar warns. "If the revenue gaps become too large,

in the cash economy, with individuals hiring unregulated workers for tasks such as housekeeping, further compromising care quality.

Professor Eagar warns the reforms could lead to a significant strain on public hospitals, with frail older people unable to secure residential care beds.

"In my region ... 20% of all public hospital beds were occupied by

people awaiting nursing home services or close entirely, further places.' exacerbating the aged care crisis.

This situation, she argues, underscores the need for changes in the Commonwealth-state health reform agreement, due for renewal in 2025.

"The states and territories need to be negotiating a special clause in that agreement about funding ... to actually cover the full costs of care for people approved for residential care who are sitting in public hospital beds."

While there is a lifetime cap on consumer contributions to their aged care, the lifetime cap applies only to what the government refers to as non-clinical care. There is no lifetime cap on accommodation. Self-funded retirees will typically pay \$127,000 a year in residential care, with half of that in daily accommodation payments.

Another missed opportunity

Professor Eagar is adamant about what the government should have

"I would position aged care with Medicare," she said, so that aged care is treated as a public entitlement, much like the healthcare system, and could be funded by a levy, similar to the Medicare levy.

"We all contribute to Medicare from the day we start working, and I think it's politically palatable to introduce an aged care levy halfway through your working life,' the professor said.

This approach would position aged care as a publicly funded and regulated system, similar to how Medicare is viewed today.

"Medicare isn't just public hospitals... it's private doctors, private specialists, nongovernment organisations," she explains.

By shifting the narrative from a private, for-profit industry to a public entitlement, she believes aged care could be embraced as an essential public service.

Expert's forecast

Professor Kathy Eagar offers a stark critique of the government's approach to aged care reform, describing it as "lazy" and just "more of the same".

As the baby boomer generation enters old age, the need for innovative solutions is becoming ever more urgent.


But Professor Eager slams the reforms as doing little to address the looming challenges, merely shifting more financial responsibility onto consumers while maintaining the same outdated care models.

"Put simply, the new Support at Home program is based on all the worst features of the NDIS applied to aged care. It's an NDIS for old people, except they have to pay a lot of money for it."
