Kristy McBain retains Eden-Monaro as Labor secures historic national victory

Labor's Kristy McBain has been re-elected as the Member for Eden-Monaro following the 2025 federal election. This election has been widely described as historic due to sweeping national changes and a decisive shift in Australia's political landscape.

The Division of Eden-Monaro spans five local government areas: Bega Valley Shire, Goulburn Mulwaree, Queanbeyan-Palerang, Snowy Monaro, and

part of the Eurobodalla Shire. It covers more than 31,000 square kilometres and has over 121,000 eligible voters.

At time of print, Kristy McBain led with 42,698 first preference votes, well ahead of Liberal candidate Jo van der Plaat, who received 31,864.

Ms McBain thanked voters and supporters in a message following confirmation of her return.

"My deepest thanks to our amazing community for putting their trust in me again to represent them. I will continue to work hard for everyone in Eden-Monaro in a positive way that unites us.

"Thank you to my family, my team, my volunteers and my colleagues, it's a privilege to do this job and I wouldn't be able to do it without them", she said.

Liberal candidate, Ms Jo van der Plaat said, "On Sunday morning, I called Kristy McBain and conceded the election in Eden-Monaro and wished her well. Being a candidate for 18 months has given me the incredible opportunity to get to know my community better and I will never be able to thank enough, the people who came out to support

"I'll never stop working for our community, and I look forward to being out and about in Eden-Monaro. But for know, it's rest, recharge and reflection".

Across the country, the 2025 election delivered a landmark result for the Australian Labor Party. Prime Minister Anthony Albanese not only secured a second term, but increased Labor's majority – the first time a sitting Prime Minister has done so since 2004. Labor is projected to hold at least 85 of the 150 seats in the House of Representatives.

One of the most striking outcomes was the defeat of Opposition Leader Peter Dutton, who lost his Queensland seat of Dickson to Labor's Ali France - an unprecedented loss for a federal opposition leader.

The result has been interpreted internationally as a rejection of right-wing, populist politics, with Dutton's campaign failing to

resonate with voters. Labor's platform, focused on cost-of-living relief, healthcare, housing, and climate action, appears to have found broad appeal, including in regions traditionally seen as conservative strongholds.

Escaped burns spark warning on safe burning practices

The RFS is reminding landholders notification portal, enabling to follow safe burning practices and ensure they notify their local fire authority and neighbours, after 30 escaped burns were reported across NSW in April - including a dozen over the Easter long weekend.

Although the Bush Fire Danger Period has ended, landholders are still required to notify their intent to burn and ensure they check local weather conditions before undertaking any burning activity. The RFS provides an online

residents to easily inform fire authorities of planned hazard reduction or pile burns at any time, via mobile device or desktop computer.

Commissioner of the RFS Rob Rogers said using the notification tool at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify plays a key role in preventing unnecessary emergency responses.

"Over the coming months, many landholders will take the opportunity to reduce fuel loads

through burning. It's critical they burn safely and notify both the RFS and their neighbours," Commissioner Rogers said.

"Even when the official Bush Fire Danger Period has ended, landholders must ensure they've obtained any required permits and permissions and provide at least 24 hours' notice before lighting

"If fire authorities are aware of your burn, it helps prevent unnecessary emergency calls and the deployment of firefighting

resources.

The online notification tool also provides notifications about any Total Fire Bans, helping landholders make informed decisions about whether to proceed with their planned burn. Commissioner of the RFS Rob Rogers stressed that while reducing fuel on private properties is encouraged, it must always be done safely and legally.

"Before lighting any fire, landholders should check local conditions and ensure they have

cleared adequate fire breaks and have firefighting equipment on hand to prevent the fire from escaping," Commissioner Rogers said.

"Every landholder has a responsibility to prevent fire spreading from their property. There are serious consequences for those who light fires and fail to manage them properly."

Guidance and assistance dogs are more than companions they're life-changers.

This International Guide Dog Day, the NSW Food Authority is celebrating the pawsitive impact these furry heroes have and reminding food businesses and the wider community that Guide Dogs are not pets.

Guide Dogs give people with low vision or blindness the independence and confidence to safely navigate daily life. However, Guide Dog handlers continue to face refusals of access to public places - including to restaurants, clubs and cafes


By law, assistance animals such as Guide Dogs must be allowed in all public places - including the indoor dining areas of cafés, restaurants, pubs and clubs. This is distinct from pet dogs, which are only allowed in outdoor dining areas and only at the discretion of the business.

Alan Edwards works in the Food Incident Response and Complaints team which supports the Food Authority and he knows first hand the extraordinary difference Guide Dogs make.

With his Guide Dog Mercury, Alan, who lives with low vision, finds it easy to stay involved in work and enjoy an active social

"I love getting out and about, meeting up with friends and family at restaurants and cafes," Alan says. "Mercury is priceless. He's made my life so much easier. He's a trained professional, knows how to behave in public and can go wherever anybody else can go."

Alan said he had personally



experienced challenges eating out, but often a conversation was all that was needed. "People often can't believe how well groomed and behaved Mercury is. They soon realise that accomodating a guide dog is easier than they

Acting CEO of the NSW Food **Authority Andrew Davies** reminded food businesses they must permit an assistance animal in areas used by their customers.

"This is legislated under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992, the Companion Animals Act 1998 (NSW) and Australia New Zealand Food Standards Code," Mr Davies said

"All hospitality and food service businesses should ensure all staff are fully aware of these legal obligations."



- · Council heard from three members of the public who made presentations about items on tonight's agenda including the Bungendore pipeline, the Nellie Hamilton Centre, and traffic safety in the Karabar schools precinct



Government green lights virtual fences Farmers have welcomed the NSW Government's move to legalise virtual fencing for cattle. NSW Farmers' Animal Welfare Committee Chair Rob McIntosh said Agriculture Minister Tara Moriarty's announcement was a sign of

positive change on the horizon for many farmers across the state.

"Across Australia and even the world, farmers are already making the most of virtual fencing, and it's about time we do the

same here in NSW," Mr McIntosh said.

"This technology can save lives by helping move livestock to safe areas in floods, fires or other natural disasters, without putting humans or animals at risk.

"It can also help reduce fencing costs, control noxious weeds and help with a whole other host of things on-farm - there's almost no boundaries to what this technology can

Mr McIntosh said regulations must be introduced swiftly to ensure the technology could be rolled out across NSW, with many harbouring hope the technology could also soon be extended for use on other livestock,

"These fences are a game changer for farmers, and we are excited about the opportunities they provide for livestock management in NSW," Mr McIntosh said.

"Enabling us to use this technology with cattle is a real leap forward, and we hope that the technology can be developed and rolled out for use with other livestock in the future.

"Tools like this will unlock productivity gains for our industry, so we can put more homegrown food on Aussie tables, more often."

Council acts on long-standing traffic concerns around Karabar schools

At its 1 May 2025 meeting, Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council unanimously passed a motion calling for urgent action to improve traffic safety around the Karabar schools precinct.

The motion, brought forward by Councillor Mareeta Grundy, directs Council to immediately investigate road and pedestrian safety in the area surrounding Cameron Road, Alanbar Street, Donald Road, Anne Street and Wilgabar Way. The precinct is home to Karabar High School, Queanbeyan South Public School, Queanbeyan South Pre-School, Tirriwirri School, and the soon-tobe-completed new daycare centre and preschool.

The investigation will assess current traffic flow, driver behaviour, and congestion during school drop-off and pick-up times. It will also review the adequacy of existing signage and examine the feasibility of installing flashing lights, improved pedestrian infrastructure, wombat crossings, speed humps and chicanes. Direct consultation with Transport for

NSW, school communities, local residents and parents will also be part of the process.

The matter will be urgently referred to the QPRC Road Safety Officer and considered by the Local Traffic Committee, with a detailed report and funding options to be presented to Council, including possible applications for state and federal grants.

Councillor Grundy welcomed the decision, saying, "This week at the Queanbeyan-Palerang Council meeting my motion on traffic safety around the Karabar schools precinct was unanimously supported. That means there will now be an urgent review conducted with investigations into signage, flashing lights, wombat crossings, chicanes and speed humps, as well as direct consultation with parents, neighbours, the schools and Transport for NSW.

"Thank you to the parents and carers who raised their concerns, in particular Mel Ry, Tegan McInnes, and Kirri Ann, and to



NSW Parliamentarian Nichole Overall MLC for her support and advocacy. It means real action addressing the very real matter of school zone safety affecting around 1,000 students of Karabar.'

Community advocate Mel Ry also praised the outcome saying, "This is a huge win for our community, residents and schools on Cameron Road, Anne Street,

Alanbar Road and Donald Road.

"A very big thank you goes out to the community who have been fighting for years to get this done to everyone who signed and shared the petition put up by Tash that received over 300 signatures, and to Councillor Mareeta Grundy and Nichole Overall who came out and supported this.'



Wombats are our beloved burrowing marsupials, and they are facing a silent but devastating threat - mange. Caused by the parasitic mite Sarcoptes scabiei, which burrows under the skin, mange leads to intense itching, fur loss, scabs along their side, ears

and eyes, infection, dehydration, and often a slow and painful death for infected wombats. If left untreated, the disease severely compromises their ability to eat, move, and protect themselves from the elements. Mange is highly contagious and can spread rapidly through wombat populations, especially in regions where burrows are shared or closely situated. Unfortunately, due to their nocturnal and solitary nature, early signs of mange often go unnoticed, allowing the disease to progress unchecked. With the cool weather approaching, wombats with mange are seen more often and can more easily suffer from pneumonia.

Thankfully, mange doesn't have to be a life sentence for our local wombats. With the Curb Wombat Mange program grant provided by

the NSW Government, NSW National Parks and Wildlife and Foundation for National Parks and Wildlife, Wildcare's Wombat Mange team are able to provide specialised treatment for mangeaffected wombats safely in their natural environment through either a pour-on method or using a burrow flap. A burrow flap is a simple and effective way of treating wombats when the team can't get close for more direct treatment. Installed over the wombat's burrow, these flaps are usually made of recycled materials, like corflute or ice cream container lids. A small container inserted into the flap holds and dispenses the treatment, such as Bravecto or Cydectin, onto the wombat as it enters or leaves the burrow. This treatment is refilled weekly for about 15 weeks until the wombat is successfully recovered. If you see a wombat with mange, please contact the 24/7 Wildcare Helpline on (02) 6299 1966.

Heart Health Checks on track for 1 million milestone as people urged to get checked

Heart Week is 5th to 11th May - a national week of awareness about Australia's leading cause of death

Australia is on track to surpass 1 million Medicare Heart Health Checks since the item was first introduced in 2019 as the Heart Foundation urges more people to get checked to avoid a heart attack or stroke.

Heart disease is a silent killer with the first signs too often being a heart attack or stroke. A Medicare Heart Health Check is the nation's best tool in the fight against heart disease, giving people an understanding of their risk up to

five years in advance - enough time to take preventive action.

Latest Medicare Benefits Schedule (MBS) data shows that more than 870,000 Heart Health Checks have been carried out on people in Australia since 2019, with around 20,000 happening each month.

Heart Foundation Healthcare Programs Manager, Natalie Raffoul, said the nation was on track to surpass 1 million Heart Health Checks before the end of the year.

"Heart Week (5th to 11th May) is the perfect time to remind people that a Heart health Check with your GP could save your life," she said.

"Heart disease is a 'silent killer' and often the first symptom is a heart attack or stroke.

"A Medicare Heart Health Check with your GP is a 20-minute check-up that calculates your risk of a heart attack or stroke in the next five years and gives you the foresight you need to take preventive action.

"We are so pleased to know that we'll hit a milestone 1 million Checks this year - but we know there is more to be done with

around 2.5 million adults in Australia at high risk of having a heart attack or stroke in the next five years.'

Beat the odds and book your Medicare Heart Health Check

The Heart Foundation is urging people aged 45 and over to book a Medicare Heart Health Check with their GP.

Some people may be eligible earlier, including First Nations peoples from 30 years and from 35 years for people living with diabetes.

Ms Raffoul said the Heart Health Check scored a number of risk factors and used those numbers to calculate an individual's risk.

"A unique algorithm developed by the Heart Foundation for use by GPs calculates this risk based on a combination of risk factors including high cholesterol, high blood pressure, and blood sugar levels," she said.

"Following the Check, your GP will develop a risk prevention plan tailored to your needs, giving you time to make important changes or take vital medications to prevent a heart attack or stroke."

National Seniors Australia

From calls for housing policy reform to height-friendly toilets, the foundations are being laid for better housing for seniors and people with dementia.

National Seniors Australia (NSA) has long championed policy reform to improve the supply of age-friendly housing across the nation.

The bottom line is that building regulations need to be updated to cater for the needs of an ageing population.

Architects and builders also need to come up to speed - and there are signs that are signs the construction sector could be

More on that later, but here's what NSA is doing to improve the safety and comfort of housing for

Our Better Housing campaign

Older Australians should have more housing choices. So, a key focus of the campaign is to make downsizing into age-friendly housing more available and affordable.

Ageing can mean not wanting to mow a big lawn or keep up with cleaning and tidying a now-empty large family home.

We are advocating for the removal of the barriers to downsizing.

One of these is the lack of suitable and accessible housing for older people to move to, in areas where they feel comfortable and safe to live. The other is the lack of suitable accommodation for seniors to rent.

Houses are being built for families, not for older people. We want the government to change the "accessible housing" design standards in the National Construction Code (NCC) to make new housing age-friendly and facilitate more downsizing options and incentivise builders to step

More and more seniors are having to access the rental market and, even if they can secure accommodation, it is unlikely to be suitable for an older person.

NSA is pushing for a capital grants scheme for the construction of suitable rental housing. The scheme should incorporate universal design principles, reducing the risk of falling, hospitalisation, or premature entry into residential care.

This builder heeds the call

Victorian builder, Mark Burnham, has worked in the construction industry for more than 35 years.

But it was his own family's journey that inspired his new generation of homes. Mark found himself with:

- A father who needed care for over a decade
- A younger brother living with
- · A family committed to supporting people with disability.

Trying to cater for his family, Mark saw how traditional housing fails to meet real-life needs. So, he decided to design something

Now, he builds houses that have:

- Zero-step entry
- No ramps and no thresholds, just smooth, level access throughout
- · Wider spaces for easier
- Cavity sliding doors, extra-wide hallways, and rooms suitable for mobility aids
- · Built-in care features, including ceiling reinforcement for a future hoist and handrails in all the right places.

Other features include accessible ensuite bathrooms, a scooter bay by the entry, easy-to-use kitchens, and drawers instead of hard-toreach cupboards - all at waistheight, reducing the need to bend and crouch.

The houses also have smart emergency system linked to the

Dementia-friendly housing

Some aged care homes are moving to more suitable accommodation that caters for residents with dementia.

There are precious few houses and apartments built in the housing market, however. People with dementia, and those living with and caring for them, are often forced to retro-fit an existing house to better suit their needs. But where to start?

There is a wealth of good ideas and resources available through Dementia Australia, which recently launched an interactive video offering straightforward and effective solutions.

Here's are some tips from Dementia Australia's Creating a Dementia Friendly Home web

- Install slip-resistant mats or tiles with a matte finish to avoid
- · Use a water-safe chair in the shower or bath and a walk-in shower base
- Use bathroom-safe heat lamps to keep the room warm
- Install a toilet that is at a comfortable height and easy to

- Make the toilet seat a different colour to its surroundings
- · Clearly label "hot" and "cold" on taps and use accessible crosshead or lever taps
- · Store things you use every day, like your toothbrush, toothpaste, comb, and deodorant, in one place so you can easily find them
- Install handrails beside the bath, shower, and toilet
- Use a hand-held shower hose
- Remove or securely store any medications
- Use night lights or motionsensor lights.

If you can't install features in different colours, use coloured tape to mark them.

Dementia Australia CEO, Professor Tanva Buchanan. emphasises the importance of supporting people with dementia, their families, and carers in maintaining independence for as long as possible.

"For the more than 433,300 Australians living with dementia, everyday activities can get harder," she said.

"This guide can help, with practical tips such as clearing walkways or using contrasting colours when setting the table.'

Are you making the most of your super contributions?



by Phil Harvey Superannuation is a vital but often underused part of Australia's

retirement system. To encourage people to use it, there are significant tax advantages compared to investing outside super.

Understanding the different types of super contributions — and how to take advantage of them — can make a significant difference to your retirement savings.

1. Concessional Contributions

Concessional contributions are made from pre-tax income and are taxed at a concessional rate of 15% when they go into the fund. The most common types include:

• Employer Contributions (Super Guarantee): Employers must contribute at least 11.5% of an employee's salary into their super. This is mandatory and forms the base of most people's super balances.

- Salary Sacrifice: Employees can ask their employer to pay part of their pre-tax salary into super. This reduces their taxable income and is a tax-effective way to boost super.
- Personal Deductible
 Contributions: Individuals,
 including the self-employed, can
 make personal contributions from
 after-tax income and claim a tax
 deduction. These are treated the
 same as salary sacrifice
 contributions.

There is a cap of \$30,000 (2024/25) for concessional contributions. However, if your total super balance is under \$500,000, you may be able to also use the unused concessional contributions for the last five years.

2. Non-Concessional Contributions

Non-concessional contributions can't be claimed as a tax deduction and are not taxed when put into super. These include:

- Voluntary Contributions:
 Anyone can contribute extra funds into their super from their savings or after-tax earnings.
- Spouse Contributions: You can contribute to your spouse's super account and may receive a tax offset of up to \$540 if your spouse earns less than \$40,000 per year.

The annual cap for non-concessional contributions is \$120,000 (2024/25), or up to \$360,000 over three years using the "bring-forward" rule if your total super balance is under \$1.9 million.

3. Government Co-Contributions

If you earn less than \$60,400 (2024/25) and make a non-concessional contribution of up to \$1,000, the government may contribute up to \$500 into your super. This is a great way for low-and middle-income earners to boost their savings with help from the government.

4. Downsizer Contributions

Australians aged 55 or older can contribute up to \$300,000 (\$600,000 for a couple) from the proceeds of selling their main residence, without it counting towards their non-concessional cap. This is particularly useful for those looking to top up their super later in life.

5. First Home Saver Scheme (FHSSS)

EPA requires surface and groundwater monitoring at Woodlawn Eco Precinct

The NSW Environment Protection In addition, the EPA will also Authority (EPA) is requiring further sampling and analysis at Veolia's Woodlawn Eco Precinct after assessments identified potential seepages from two onsite wastewater collection dams.

The works will include the installation of five additional strategically located groundwater monitoring bores, as well as onsite pollutant monitoring.

This follows a Hydrogeological Risk Assessment (HRA), prepared as part of Veolia's updated licence requirements, that identified wastewater from the dams potentially seeping into the site's groundwater system and possibly into nearby waterways.

conduct some surface and ground water monitoring in May in waterways including Crisps Creek and Allianoyonyiga Creek, as well as in Veolia groundwater bores.

NSW EPA Director Adam Gilligan said this was in response to two EPA samples taken from the creeks within in the Eco Precinct that found small detections of a range of chemicals commonly found in landfills, including PFAS chemicals and metals.

"We want to reassure the community that these detections pose no immediate health risk, as the results are within the current Australian Drinking Water Guidelines health-based limits, noting that neither creek is a direct drinking water source," Mr Gilligan

"Testing also found some minor exceedances of relevant guideline values for livestock and freshwater species in both creeks on the Eco Precinct site and we will now be undertaking further sampling to determine whether there are any elevated levels offsite and to determine next steps.

"Elevated levels of metals are also not unexpected in streams and creeks that flow through rural environments, and water quality issues are more commonplace in drought and dry periods when salinity, pH and chemicals can reach higher than normal concentrations and algal blooms can occur in surface water."

The presence of PFAS in the environment does not necessarily indicate that there is a health risk, however identifying sites that require investigation is an important precaution to reduce the risk of community exposure to

NSW Health advises that water from rivers, creeks and groundwater should not be used for drinking or cooking and personal hygiene (including cleaning teeth and bathing) without testing and appropriate treatment including disinfection. Untreated water may contain disease causing micro-organisms, chemical contaminants or algal

ANZAC Day 2025

Perfect autumn weather set the tone for ANZAC Day 2025, with thousands gathering at dawn and main services across the region to reflect on the courage and sacrifice of Australian servicemen and women.

At Bungendore's main service, this year's commemoration paid special tribute to the oftenoverlooked Greece and Crete campaigns of the Second World War-battles that tested the limits of endurance, strategy, and the unbreakable spirit of the ANZACs.

The campaign began with the pivotal Battle of Cape Matapan off the coast of Crete in March 1941, where HMAS Perth and allied cruisers narrowly escaped a superior Italian force, only to regroup and later help deliver a decisive naval victory. Italian losses at Matapan crippled their naval capacity in the Mediterranean, allowing the safe passage of troop convoys vital for the defence of Greece and the eventual evacuation of thousands of Allied troops months later. As April unfolded, Australian forces



joined British and New Zealand troops in what became known as the Battle of Greece. Vastly

The final act of the campaign played out on Crete, where a German airborne invasion met with initial disaster, suffering heavy casualties at the hands of Allied troops and fiercely resistant Cretan civilians. Despite numerical superiority, poor intelligence and miscommunication left the strategically vital Maleme airfield exposed. Its loss allowed German reinforcements to arrive and turn the tide of battle. A tenday struggle followed,

culminating in an Allied evacuation that saved thousands but at great costover 3,000 Australian soldiers were captured and more than 15,000 Allied troops became casualties.

Through all three campaigns, the courage, resilience, and sacrifice of Australian forces stood as a powerful reminder of the ANZAC spirit.

This year commemorates the 110th anniversary of the landing at Gallipoli, we honour those who have





dedicated their lives to defending our nation and way of life, as well as the vital support from communities and families.

As at 22 April 2025, approximately 1000
Australian Defence Force members are currently deployed on operations across Australia, the Indo-Pacific region and the globe, continuing the Anzac spirit while serving Australia's national interests at home and overseas.



Have your say on 19 Gibraltar Street

QPRC

We want to hear from the Bungendore community about their thoughts for the future of the vacant block at 19 Gibraltar Street. Council purchased this block for a new office after our previous office on Majara Street was compulsorily acquired for the Bungendore High School. Now that the Bungendore High School is being built at a new location, we will be moving back into our old office on Majara Street once the Department of Education no longer require it in 2027.

What is the background to this proposal?

We purchased the block for \$1.3m, using compensation funds from the NSW Government. Council have signed a Deed of Settlement that will see the return of our Majara Street office. Costs of relocation back to Majara Street and refurbishment are included in the compensation claim.

However, the costs of purchasing 19 Gibraltar Street has to be funded by its sale or from Council's general fund, and will need to be completed by 2030.

Council resolved to consider a report on options for the block, after investigating the current market value and consulting with the community through a public submission process.

What is being considered?

There are five ideas that we are seeking feedback on. One of the ideas is just temporary. You can also provide your own suggestions in the survey.

- 1. Sell the land as is
- 2. Subdivide and sell as 2 or 3 lots
- 3. We develop the site, construct the approved Development Application, sell or lease the constructed building
- 4. Don't sell the site and establish a town park with gardens, market areas, trees, seating, pedestrian access and lighting
- 5. Temporarily use the site as a pop-up stall/markets/food truck

What factors are we considering around each idea?

We have a fact sheet which outlines some of the considerations for each idea. The fact sheet is available in the document library. We are also asking for your feedback about factors we should

Proposed Woodlawn Tank Farm State Significant Development 10_0012 Modification 8

On behalf of Veolia Environmental Services (Australia) Pty Ltd (the proponent), GHD Pty Ltd (heritage consultants) is commencing Aboriginal community consultation as part of the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment (ACHA) for the Woodlawn Bioreactor (WBR) Tank Farm 2 Modification (the proposed modification). The proposed modification is located at 619 Collector Road, Tarago within the Goulburn Mulwarree Council LGA. The area subject to the assessment is shown in Figure 1.

The WBR was approved by the then Minister for Urban Affairs and Planning on 30 November 2000. An application to expand the WBR was approved on 16 March 2012 under Part 3A of the NSW Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 (EP&A Act). The WBR receives up to 1.13 million tonnes per year of putrescible waste for landfilling. The majority of the waste (up to 900,000 tonnes) is received from Sydney via rail, with smaller portions from local councils (up to 130,000 tonnes) and residual waste from the Mechanical Biological Treatment Facility (up to 100,000 tonnes) via road.

The project approval was transitioned to State Significant Development (SSD) on 14 June 2019 and is now referred to as SSD MP10_0012-Mod-8.

Veolia is seeking to modify SSD MP10 0012-Mod-8 to expand the storage capacity for treated leachate by constructing a new tank farm in a greenfield area of the site (to be referred to as 'Tank Farm 2').

The proposed modification will involve:

- Construction of up to eight (8), 13.5 megalitre tanks to hold treated leachate pumped from the existing approved storage dams and leachate treatment plant
- Pipeline and use of portable pumps to transport the leachate from the proposed tank farm 1 (Modification 6) to the proposed Tank Farm 2
- Excavation and earthworks to prepare the proposed area for Tank Farm 2, including installation of a bund providing 110% capacity of one of the tanks.

The proposed modification requires assessment in accordance with the Planning Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements SEARs SSD 10 0012-Mod-8, and with regard to State Significant Development Guidelines - preparing a modification report.

Queanbeyan Whites fight back to seal 38-36 win over Tuggeranong

After having the bye last weekend the Queanbeyan Whites will be travelling out to Jamison Oval this Saturday as they take on Wests and look to regain top spot.

Before the bye the Whites hosted Tuggeranong at Campese Field with First grade taking the win, 38-36. The Whites opened the scoring with a try in the corner to half back Cullin Cooper-Jones. The try came off the back of a penalty to the Whites for a high tackle. In the ensuing play hooker Ewald Kruger, prop John Madjaga, flanker Waisea Tudulu and No 8 Riley Turner all came close but the Tuggeranong defence held. An attempted clearing kick was easily fielded by fullback Nate Carroll who linked up with winger Koko Salim. Salim broke the line, before coming back in field slightly drawing a number of the Vikings players and leaving Cooper-Jones open to stroll across the line. The Whites were ahead 7-0.

Throughout the game Captain Andrew McFarlane and Carroll easily fielded Vikings attempts at clearing kicks and turned the pressure onto the opposition. Mid way through the second half the Whites increased their lead as Madjaga and flanker Judah Qoro Saumaisue kept the Whites moving forward, gaining valuable metres in the middle of the field before a loose ball was pounced on by the Vikings. A penalty for a high tackle gave the Whites a lineout 10 metres out and try to Carroll in the far corner. Cooper-Jones converted and the lead was reduced to 24-36.

The Whites continued to attack. Second rower Jack Gordon secured a lineout ball, Segala broke the line taking the ball up the middle, before connecting with Creighton whose cut out pass put Salim in the clear. Salim's pass in the dead ball zone to Cooper-Jones perhaps caused supporters to hold their breath but it secured the try under the posts and an easy



conversion - 31-36 at the 60 minute mark.

Over the next 10 minutes (including a Vikings sin bin) both teams had their opportunities, but it was the Whites who were able to convert, taking advantage of a short arm penalty just inside their half. Sagala received the pass and moved the ball forward with

a clearing kick which dribbled into the dead ball zone and seemed destined to roll over the end. It was watched carefully but ultimately complacently by Church as Carroll came racing through to dive on the ball just before it went out. The Whites regained the lead 38-36.

The Chooks' 78-17 win over the Yass Rams after leading 33-7 at half time was considerably less nail-biting, the team scoring 12 tries including trebles to winger Uraia 'Woody' Rabici and centre Maloni Tubekitu, and single efforts to halfback Tom Worman and his brother Jack, centre Jone Waqa, flyhalf Kyle Shand, flyhalf Jye Russell and 'number eight' David Cox.

Tom Worman kicked six conversions and Woody put over three. This was the third game out of four that the Mudchooks have scored 60 or points or more, two of them over 70.


Impressive stuff so far, but as always there is still plenty of work to do. There was a period in the second half when the team came off the boil for a while and allowed Yass to score two converted tries
