Smartphones: the parasite of the modern era?

Smartphones have become "the greatest parasite of the modern age", according to new research from The Australian National University (ANU).

According to lead author
Associate Professor Rachael
Brown, smartphones pose unique
societal risks, sucking up our time,
attention and personal information,
all in the interest of technology
companies.

"These devices have radically changed our lives," she said.

"Despite their benefits, many of us are hostage to our phones, unable to fully disconnect."

Associate Professor Brown said while the human-smartphone relationship may have started as one that helped us stay in touch and find useful information, it has quickly soured as smartphones have become near-indispensable. "Our phones, or more precisely, some of the apps that we use on them, have come to serve the interests of the app-making

companies and their advertisers more faithfully than their human users," Associate Professor Brown

"These apps are designed to keep us scrolling, to make us click on advertising and even trigger outrage.

"The behaviour of our phones frequently thwarts our expressed goals and desires in order to achieve the goals of the companies that make them. In this, users and their phones are,

at least some of the time, akin to hosts and their parasites."
So where to next? Associate
Professor Brown said it remains to be seen whether we can restore the relationship to one that's

"Evolution shows that two things are key: an ability to detect exploitation when it occurs, and the capacity to respond," she said. "In the case of the smartphone, exploitation is frequently covert and hidden from view.

mutually beneficial.

"It's not as straightforward as simply putting down our phones - we've ceded various cognitive tasks to them, such as memory and navigation.

"New collective strategies and interventions that limit what our parasites can legally do might be the most effective route." The paper is published in the Australasian Journal of Philosophy.

Winter's here: time to shield our most vulnerable from respiratory illness surge

Winter has officially arrived across Australia, bringing with it a surge in acute respiratory infections that are filling hospital beds.

he Australian Medical Association is urging people to prioritise conversations with their GP about vaccination against COVID-19, influenza, and RSV, particularly for those at greatest risk.

New data from Western Australia demonstrates the remarkable impact of vaccination programs, with its RSV immunisation program achieving a 57 per cent reduction in hospitalisations among infants, saving the WA health system an estimated \$6.2-6.9 million in hospital costs

AMA President Dr Danielle McMullen said the success of this program demonstrated the power of evidence-based prevention.

"These results show what's possible when we get vaccination right, with more babies being kept out of hospital because their parents chose to protect them," Dr McMullen said.

"The timing could not be more critical with RSV cases climbing since the start of 2025, and children under five most at risk."

Dr McMullen said reductions in vaccination rates for COVID-19 boosters and influenza were alarming.

"New COVID-19 strains continue to circulate leading to increased hospitalisations, making regular boosters essential for maintaining protection against severe illness."

Across the country, influenza vaccine coverage sits at just 24.24 per cent nationally and just 14 per cent across all age groups under the age of 50 years.

"We are particularly concerned by vaccination rates among Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, which have declined across all age groups.

"Meanwhile COVID-19 booster coverage has dropped significantly in people aged 75 and over, falling from 38.2 per cent to just 326.2 per cent in the past 12 months."

Dr McMullen said Australia now had unprecedented tools to prevent serious respiratory illness and urged people to visit their GP and get vaccinated. If patients are unsure of which vaccination they need or are worried because of the misinformation appearing on social media, their GP can provide expert guidance and the necessary facts to support them in making an informed decision.

"The national RSV prevention program offers free maternal vaccination and targeted infant protection. Annual influenza vaccines provide strong protection, with more than 98 per cent of this year's circulating strains matching vaccine components.

"The evidence is clear – vaccines work. But vaccines sitting in fridges don't save lives. We need people to pay attention, particularly parents of young children and older Australians.







Real-world training strengthens NSW's FMD preparedness

The NSW Government has continued its approach to preparedness for potential future foot-and-mouth disease (FMD) outbreaks by investing in skilled, real-world training for frontline staff.

Two Local Land Services District Veterinarians recently took part in an intensive four-day course run by the European Commission for the Control of Foot-and-Mouth Disease (EuFMD) held in Kenya, Africa.

Mark Doyle and Lara Mitchell, based in the South East and Riverina regions of NSW, joined from around the world, including Romania, Italy, Iceland and the Netherlands, to learn firsthand from farmers and field experts how to recognise, diagnose and manage

FMD is a serious and highly contagious disease that affects all cloven-hoofed animals such as cattle, sheep and goats, which causes lesions, fever, drooling and lameness and, in some cases death. It is commonly spread through the movement of infected





District Veterinarian Mark Doyle described the training as invaluable.

"Nothing compares to seeing the disease firsthand; there's no way you can prepare as effectively from pictures, videos, webinars or textbooks," he said.

"The opportunity to visit the farms and talk with the Kenyan farmers about how they handled their livestock was invaluable."

Australia is currently FMD free, however, its ability to establish in countries like Indonesia means there is an ongoing risk, which would have devastating impacts on the agricultural industry.

The training course is held in an endemic country to give vets typically from FMD-free countries a unique opportunity to apply onfarm biosecurity protocols and follow clinical and epidemiological procedures.

Participants gain valuable insights from speaking directly with farmers in areas where there are active outbreaks and test their knowledge through practical biosecurity exercises, sampling, packaging and lesion aging in a situational context.

Riverina Local Land Services District Veterinarian Lara Mitchell said she learned a lot from the experience.

"It was interesting seeing how agriculture and biosecurity is managed in other countries,

particularly those that are landlocked," she said.

"It highlighted for me that Australia is doing a great job at maintaining biosecurity and helping our agricultural industry to remain free of things like FMD and lumpy skin disease."

Local Land Services' District Veterinarians play a key role in emergency animal disease management across NSW, working closely with landholders to identify and prevent the spread of disease to protect the agricultural industry.

Sixteen District Veterinarians have completed EuFMD training since

The Bureau of Meteorology issues winter long-range forecast

The Bureau of Meteorology recently issued its long-range forecast for winter 2025.

While winter is a time for cooler weather, the winter long-range forecast shows day and night temperatures are likely to be above average across Australia for this time of the year.

Winter rainfall is likely to be above average for interior and central parts of the country. For parts of Australia's tropical north, the south-east and the south-west, rainfall is expected to be in the typical winter range. Typical rainfall means there's a roughly equal possibility for these areas to receive above, below or near-average rainfall.

This includes parts of South Australia, Victoria and Tasmania that have been affected by prolonged dry conditions as well as parts of New South Wales recently impacted by severe flooding.

This winter forecast follows an autumn which was much wetter than average in the north and east of Australia, and much drier than average in many southern parts.

Australia's fire agencies advise there is an unseasonal increased risk of fire this winter across parts of South Australia and Victoria.

The Bureau updates the longrange forecast each Thursday and you can search the latest details for your location on the Bureau's website.

New South Wales and the ACT

Winter rainfall is expected to be above average for much of the state and the ACT.

However, parts of the state's east are likely to have rainfall in the typical range.

Average winter rainfall in recent decades has been between 100 and 300 mm along most of eastern New South Wales, with higher falls in the alpine regions, while in western and central New South Wales winter averages are between 25 and 100 mm.

Warmer than usual winter maximum temperatures are likely across the state, and warmer than usual winter minimum temperatures are very likely

Autumn Preliminary Summary

Autumn has been warmer than usual for most of Australia.
Throughout much of the south and west, daytime temperatures were very much above average.

Victoria had its warmest autumn on record, New South Wales

had its second warmest, and South Australia and Western Australia had their third warmest autumn on record. Autumn has been drier than average across much of the country's south and west.

Slow-moving high pressure systems to the south of the continent are contributing to drier conditions in the south. This pattern has also enhanced coastal troughs off New South Wales and southern Queensland, contributing to the recent above average coastal rainfall in these states.

Conditions have been wetter than usual for much of the east and north, with rainfall very much above average in large parts of Queensland.

Tropical activity, including Tropical Cyclone Alfred and a low pressure trough over western Queensland, brought widespread rainfall and flooding during March and April.

Autumn rainfall was very much below average in large parts of the south-east and the west coast. In Tasmania, autumn rainfall was the second lowest on record.

Scouts, oyster farmers and Queanbeyan landcare join forces for tree planting event at Fernleigh Park

Queanbeyan Landcare

In a continuation of the 2022 Planting Trees for The Queen's Jubilee Program, Queanbeyan Landcare organised a planting event at Fernleigh Park on Sunday, May 25, 2025. The original program saw several hundred trees planted around the Fernleigh Park Community Hall. While most of these trees have survived, some were lost or damaged over time.

To address this, the 1st Jerrabomberra Scout group worked with locals from Fernleigh and members of Queanbeyan Landcare to not only replace the lost trees but also expand the planting area. The event was a resounding success, with over

100 new trees planted. The Scouts played a pivotal role, demonstrating dedication and teamwork throughout the day.

A unique aspect of this year's effort was the installation of old oyster pots as tree guards to ensure the young plants' survival. The pots were donated by a Tathra oyster farmer and transported and repurposed in collaboration with Local Land Services and other Landcare groups. It is hoped these long-lasting oyster pots will offer critical protection against browsing animals and enhance the survival rate of the new plantings, marking a significant step toward ensuring the longevity of the trees.



Resilience, Reflection & Renewal

Bungendore-based artist Sarah Richards is set to launch her first solo exhibition. Resilience. Reflection & Renewal, at Rusten House Art Centre from 28 June to 19 July. Featuring twelve original artworks, the collection offers a creative exploration of the cycles of life-capturing moments of growth, pause, connection and transformation.

Sarah, a proud Ngiyampaa woman and founder of Marrawuy Journeys, began the project while planning designs for her 2026 calendar. Rather than reuse past pieces, she set herself the ambitious goal of creating twelve new works in just six monthseach one thoughtfully aligned to a different point in the year.

"This is the first time I've created a full body of work in one concentrated period," Sarah said. "Each piece was carefully considered-not only in terms of visual design and colour, but also in how it might resonate with people throughout the seasons."

The resulting collection is rich in symbolism, with recurring elements such as footprints, ripples, trees, and abstract paths that speak to renewal, resilience and the interconnected nature of personal arowth

Creativity has always been central to Sarah's life, with painting emerging as her preferred medium from a young age. In 2018, her passion for art intersected with her background in business and strategy, leading to the creation of Marrawuy Journeys-a platform where creativity, culture and wellbeing meet.

As a CPA, Executive MBA graduate, 2015 ACT NAIDOC Artist of the Year and 2023 Canberra Indigenous Businesswoman of the Year, Sarah brings a unique blend of creative insight and strategic thinking to her work. Through vibrant colours and intricate detail, her paintings tell stories of healing and cultural connection.

Through Marrawuy Journeysnamed after the red kangaroo in Ngiyampaa language, symbolising forward movement-Sarah blends visual art with facilitation and wellbeing-focused initiatives. What began as a creative enterprise focused on storytelling through art has grown into a broader offeringsupporting organisations through professional services that build on that creative foundation.

Her client base spans the corporate, education, government and not-for-profit sectors-ranging from large organisations and universities to community-focused groups. Whether through corporate commissions, team-building workshops or strategic facilitation, Sarah's work helps teams grow, connect, and lead with purpose.



The exhibition will open with a launch event on Saturday 28 June from 2-4pm. An Artist Talk is also scheduled for Saturday 12 July, offering visitors an opportunity to hear more about Sarah's process and the stories behind the works.

Sarah hopes the exhibition will encourage visitors to reflect

Theileria in non-endemic areas: what cattle owners should know

A diagnosis of Theileriosis this autumn in cattle in our region surprised me recently. While this tick-borne disease is endemic along the NSW coast, it remains rare in this area—this is the first confirmed case I've encountered here in years.

Theileriosis is caused by a blood parasite that lives in both red and white blood cells. It is transmitted by the bush tick (Haemaphysalis longicornis), which picks up the parasite while feeding on infected cattle and can pass it onto other animals. These ticks don't just feed on cattle - they can also feed on kangaroos and deer, making them highly mobile disease vectors. This means the disease can transmit without direct cattle-to-cattle contact and is not limited by fences or roads.

Why did this happen this year?

Historically, cattle movements in our region have been fairly local, and our cold, dry winters have likely limited tick survival. Along the NSW coast, milder, more humid conditions allow the tick to survive year-round and spread the disease. However, changing climate conditions and more frequent cattle movements mean this risk is evolving. Cattle brought in from coastal areas may carry both the blood parasite and the tick that transmits it into our district.

What's the risk?

Cattle from endemic areas often have the disease in a carrier

state—they may look healthy but can still infect bush ticks, which then spread the disease to naïve cattle. While carrier cattle are generally not sick themselves unless severely stressed, they may pose a risk to local herds that have never been exposed, if they arrive carrying the bush tick vector with them.

There are newer strains of Theileria—introduced to Australia around 2006—that cause more severe disease than previously seen. Clinical signs include lethargy, pale or yellow mucous membranes, laboured breathing, reduced appetite, reproductive failure, and in some cases, sudden death. There is no registered treatment or vaccine.

The number of ticks around usually relates to how bad the disease is. However, the bush tick only stays on the host for a few days before dropping off, so the number of ticks on the cattle doesn't really give a clear idea of the total tick population. There could be more ticks in the environment that we don't notice. While our tableland climate is less favourable to bush ticks—meaning a large-scale outbreak is unlikely—the cost of even a few sick or dead cattle is too high to ignore.

Prevention is far more effective and economical than dealing with the consequences.

Naïve cattle in the third trimester of pregnancy and young calves are particularly at risk, as their immune systems are either under strain or not yet fully developed. These



animals are more likely to develop severe clinical signs if exposed.

Most producers are aware of the risk of moving naïve cattle into endemic areas. But fewer realise the danger of moving carrier cattle into non-endemic areas like ours. While there's no legal obligation, being mindful of the potential to spread disease and ticks helps safeguard the broader farming community.

What can you do?

- Consider the source of bought in cattle: are they coming from the Theileria endemic zone?
- Time introductions wisely: If you must bring cattle from endemic areas, consider doing so during

the cooler months when tick activity is naturally lower.

- Use effective tick control: Treat introduced cattle with a product that kills bush ticks within 24-48 hours. Ideally, treatment should be administered before transport, but if that isn't possible, do it immediately upon arrival.
- Note that not all tick treatments—particularly pour-on and injectable formulations—are registered for managing bush tick. It's worth seeking veterinary advice about appropriate products, including potential offlabel use and its implications.
- Monitor stock closely: Especially around calving or during stressful periods such as transport.

Theileria can cause disease in vulnerable animals even if they've been carriers for some time.

 Even if cattle are not showing clinical signs, your veterinarian can test a small number of animals in the herd to determine whether they are naïve or already in a carrier state. This can help inform your biosecurity management plan for the farm.

As part of South East Local Land Services continued effort to manage pest animal population, recent aerial shooting operations have been carried out across 222,000ha of consenting land, with further programs planned.

Aerial control is effective in achieving a fast knockdown of pest animal populations; however, it is really important that landholders keep the momentum going. Follow-up control such as ground shooting, baiting and trapping is essential to prevent populations from bouncing back.

By managing pest animals responsibly, you are helping to protect the health of your local environment, the viability of your farms, and the safety of your communities.

Australian native bees

When the term pollinator is mentioned, people think of European honeybees. But Australia is home to many native bees that work away tirelessly to help pollinate our flora, not to mention our orchards and crops. There are some small things you can do to encourage them onto your land and pollinate your plants.

One important thing about native bees is that they are closely tied to their environment's health. Three basic needs must be met: food, safe nesting sites and protection from pesticides.

To support native bees on your property, protect patches of native vegetation from the impacts of livestock, plant a diversity of flowering native shrubs, plant fallow fields, cover crops, or road edges. Starting a native revegetation project on your property around waterways will also enhance your property as a food source for bees. This is because bees are drawn to areas with abundant nectar, so planting dense local native species that flower throughout the year will keep them coming back.

A safe habitat comes down to understanding that native bees nest differently to honeybees. Depending on the type of native bee, you will not see the typical hive associated with the honeybee. Native bees can be found as wood nesting or ground nesting. Knowing that native bees look for different habitats, pay close attention to the trees and ground cover near flowering plants and waterways. They can also tunnel into bare ground near waterways or find shelter in dead wood and hollow logs. If you notice native bees, take a picture of them and post it on citizen science apps like iNaturalist. Experts will help identify the type of bee and its nesting habit. Look at the image, would you be able to spot this native beehive on your land?

Protection from pesticides is vital for supporting healthy bee populations on your property. Most bees are at risk when pesticides are sprayed on flowering crops.



Be mindful of their habitat and blooming period, if you do need to spray, aim for early in the morning or late afternoon when bees are less active.

It is important to pay close attention to your land and the practices you undertake as it will greatly impact the pollination of your plants and crops. The next time you are walking around your property, take note of bee activity and consider: what you are doing to encourage pollinators in your area?

Weed to Watch - Spanish heath (Erica lusitanica)

Originally from Europe, Spanish heath is a highly invasive woody weed that seeds prolifically. In heath and woodland ecosystems, it can outcompete native species reducing biodiversity and habitat values.

What does it look like?

Spanish heath is an erect, woody shrub usually growing to around 1 - 2m tall although it can grow larger in ideal conditions. From autumn to spring produces masses of small, white-pinkish bell-shaped flowers approx. 5mm in length.

How does it spread?

Each Spanish heath plant can produce millions of very fine dust-like seeds. This seed is readily transported by vehicles and machinery allowing Spanish heath to spread along roadways from where it can invade adjoining bushland or farmland.

Where should you look for it?

Places you might find Spanish heath on your property include disturbed areas, roads, tracks and other areas where machinery or vehicles have come onto your property.

What should you do if you find it?

It is important to identify Spanish heath correctly as some of our native heaths can look similar. If you think you have found this plant, call your local council biosecurity weeds officer or your nearest South East Local Land Services office.

Don't let pigs hog the food - act now!

As temperatures drop and dry conditions persist across parts of the region, feral pig activity is expected to increase. With less feed available, pigs are more likely to seek out grain trails and livestock feeders — competing directly with stock for food.

We are urging landholders to take proactive steps to manage feral pig populations, particularly in the lead-up to lambing season.

Where appropriate, landholders are encouraged to use control methods such as baiting and trapping. Coordinated planning with neighbours will help ensure the best results.

This is the ideal time to act. Cooler weather means feral pigs are hungrier, and with dry conditions

across some of our region reducing natural food sources, they're more likely to take grain — making baiting and trapping much more effective.

We offer landholders access to expert advice, coordination support, and resources to assist with trapping and baiting programs.

Effective feral pig control doesn't happen in isolation. Planning and coordination between neighbours and our team is essential to reduce populations and protect crops and livestock.

Peak body 'reluctantly' supports delay to new Aged Care Act

The Older Persons Advocacy Network (OPAN) reluctantly supports today's announcement of a four-month delay to the commencement of the new rightsbased Aged Care Act. Overall, it is the right decision for older people.

"Until now, OPAN has been steadfast in its call for the Act to be implemented, as promised, on 1 July 2025, because older people can't get the aged care they need without it," OPAN CEO

Craig Gear OAM said. "However, over the past weeks, it has become increasingly apparent that, while the macro design of the reform is solid, older people don't have the necessary information to make informed choices at an individual level, particularly around the new Support at Home program.

"We are also concerned that the appropriate systems aren't yet in place to ensure continuity of care and services for older people during the transition. "It is for these reasons, OPAN reluctantly supports the delay announced by the Minister for

Health and Ageing and the Minister for Disability and the NDIS Mark Butler and the Minister for Aged Care and Seniors Sam Rae today," Mr Gear said. OPAN called for the release of a minimum 20,000 additional home care packages during the four-month delay to reduce the current 83,000 people waiting up to 11 months to receive the appropriate level of home care.

"Inadequate in-home care support pushes older people prematurely into residential aged care," Mr Gear said. OPAN and COTA last week wrote to government to jointly raise their concerns.

Mr Gear said the additional time must be used to fast-track the rights-based legislation, which will:

- deliver faster services
- give older people more choice and control over their aged care

- provide stronger protections
- manage complaints in an easier and more respectful manner
- have significant consequences for providers who do the wrong thing

"This is not the time to take our foot off the pedal. Older people have been waiting years for an Act that enshrines their rights in legislation. This delay risks pushing out the timeline for them to receive more timely and rights focused aged care," Mr Gear said

"We need to use this four-month window to urgently address outstanding issues, which include accessible hardship provisions for those with limited means, and roadblocks in the single assessment system which are exacerbating waiting times for inhome aged care.

"Older people must also be provided with the level of detail they need to make informed choices and give their informed consent."

Reform delay backed, but home care action need now

National Seniors Australia

NSA supports the aged care reform delay to get it right but calls for urgent action to fix home care now.

National Seniors Australia (NSA) supports the government's decision to delay implementation of the new Aged Care Act to 1 November 2025 but calls for the immediate release of additional home care packages to ease home care wait times.

NSA chief executive officer, Chris Grice, said while the peak consumer body supports a delay to the aged care reforms to ensure providers are ready and consumers are informed, the 83,000 people waiting for a Home Care Package can't be forgotten.

"NSA supports additional time to ensure a smooth transition to the changes, but we are running out of time for vulnerable Australians desperately waiting for support at home," Mr Grice said.

"National Seniors Australia is calling for an immediate increase in the number of Home Care Packages to reduce the wait list to approximately 25,000 people by 1 January 2026.

"We keep hearing about the delivery of 'once in a generation reforms that put older Australians at the centre of their care.' They are inspirational words, but they are meaningless for the 83,000 people living in the community waiting for care."

While the wait list has steadily decreased since June 2019, wait times have shot up again since 2023, with almost 83,000 older Australians now waiting for a Home Care Package.

"The government's response to the final report of the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety in May 2021 assured us, "the respect for senior Australians is, and must be, a national priority".

"This once-in-a-generation opportunity was reaffirmed by the current government with the same passion prior to the election," Mr Grice said.

"Clearing the home care wait list was one of the many recommendations of the Aged Care Royal Commission, one National Seniors Australia has always seen as a top priority for the Federal Government.

World Elder Abuse Awareness Day

Seniors Rights Service

World Elder Abuse Awareness Day was held on 15 June. It is a chance to raise awareness of the many types of abuse that older people experience. Join us to stand against the abuse, mistreatment and neglect of older people in all its forms.

What is Elder Abuse?

Elder abuse is a reality in our homes and communities. The World Health Organisation (WHO) defines elder abuse as any single or repeated act or lack of action that causes harm or distress to an older person in a relationship where there's an expectation of trust.

Elder abuse is a serious problem in Australia and it needs our attention. The ABS population projections show that over the next 25 years the number of people over 65 will double to around 9 million Australians.

Key Facts

- 1 in 6 older Australians reported experiencing abuse in the previous 12 months
- Poor physical or psychological health and higher levels of isolation are more likely to lead to elder abuse
- Almost two thirds of older people don't seek help when they're abused (61%)
- Family and friends are the most common source of support for older people who experience abuse but they are also too often responsible for the abuse

- 14,541 reports to the Ageing and Disability Commission about older people, a 108% (two-fold) increase over five years
- The most common reported type of alleged abuse of older people to the Ageing and Disability Commission was psychological (39%), financial abuse (29%) and neglect (21%)

Types of Elder Abuse

There are many different ways that older people can be mistreated. The National Plan to Respond to the Abuse of Older Australians (2019-2023) lists five common forms of abuse:

- financial
- emotional/psychological
- physicalsexual
- neglect

It's important to note that abuse can be a mix of these types, intentional or unintentional, one time or repeated and carried out by someone known to the older person like a family member, friend, professional or caregiver.

No older person should be subjected to any form of abuse.

If you are unsure about asking for help, remember, it is your right to feel safe. No person should be subjected to any form of abuse, mistreatment or neglect. Elder abuse is a form of violence and it is unacceptable.

Ageism

Ageism can include how we think (stereotypes), how we feel (prejudice), and how we act (discrimination) towards people based on their age. Ageism may be more prevalent and socially accepted than sexism and racism, yet the least understood. Ageism is not harmless and its existence contributes to the prevalence of abuse of older people. Ageism has serious and wide ranging consequences for our health and wellbeing. It can lead to poorer physical and mental health, increased social isolation and loneliness, financial insecurity, decreased quality of life and even premature death.

Signs of elder abuse may include:

malnutrition and dehydration

- poor personal hygiene or dirty clothes
- · untreated medical problems
- fear, depression or low mood, confusion, feeling of helplessness
- unexplained and frequent injuries such as black eyes and broken bones
- unexplained sexually transmitted infections
- missing belongings
- not having money for basics (food, clothing, transport and bills)

In Australia, the reporting of elder abuse is increasing. The Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety found serious issues in residential aged care. But abuse also happens outside of institutional settings, as shown in the National Elder Abuse Prevalence Study released in December 2021 by the Australian Institute of Family Studies.

CWA of NSW activates Disaster Relief Fund for flood and drought affected communities across the state

The Country Women's Association and Western regions of NSW, (CWA) of NSW recently announced the activation of its Disaster Relief Fund to support communities across the state facing the impacts of both devastating floods and ongoing drought conditions.

Up to \$500,000 has been initially earmarked for flood recovery efforts, and up to \$250,000 has been allocated to support those affected by drought, with both streams of support reflecting the unique needs and scale of the impact in each part of the state.

In areas affected by recent severe flooding, particularly on the Mid North Coast and in the Hunter region, CWA of NSW assistance will be delivered through local CWA branches, enabling timely, community-led distribution of essential support such as vouchers and goods.

In drought-affected areas, particularly in the South West where many farmers are heading into a long and difficult winter, individual financial assistance will be available to eligible primary producers, continuing the CWA of NSW's well-established model of direct drought aid.

"We know that the needs of communities impacted by disaster aren't one-size-fits-all," said CWA of NSW State President Tanya

"Our approach ensures that support is practical, local, and gets to those who need it most. Whether that's through our trusted branches during flood recovery, or directly to primary producers in drought-affected regions."

The CWA of NSW has a strong track record in distributing drought assistance efficiently and fairly, with applications assessed using the NSW DPI Combined Drought Indicator Map. While the flood recovery effort will require a



longer-term, whole-of-community response, the association is using its local networks to provide immediate support wherever possible.

"We are doing the best we can with the resources we have, and we can assure the public that every dollar donated to our Disaster Relief Fund goes directly to helping people in need," Tanya said.

"Whether it's getting basics to flood-impacted households or easing the burden on farming families battling drought, the CWA

of NSW is always practical in its approach and here to help as much as we are able."

The CWA of NSW is also calling on the broader community. businesses, and philanthropic partners to donate to the Disaster Relief Fund to help increase the reach and impact of this vital assistance.

First national stocktake of Australia's food stystem reveals hiden costs and big opportunities

A new report shines a light on the complex challenges and opportunities facing Australia's \$800 billion food system.

CSIRO, Australia's national science agency, has completed the first-ever national stocktake of our \$800 billion food system, which feeds around 100 million people - including 27 million Australians - with food produced by 100,000 farmers.

Recently released as part of the Food System Horizons initiative, the report urged a new approach to managing and reporting on our food system to make it more resilient to the challenges faced by farmers, to deliver healthy food for all, and to meet critical sustainability challenges.

The report also revealed the hidden costs of Australia's food system could be as high as \$274 billion - primarily environmental and health impacts - the highest hidden costs per capita in the world.

As the first national stocktake to deepen our understanding of Australia's complex food system, the report highlights strengths and identifies practical strategies for improvement.

CSIRO Agriculture and Food Director Dr Michael Robertson said knowing and understanding the state of our food system through regular reporting is the critical first step in dealing with the complex challenges and opportunities facing Australia's food system.

"Our food system is more than just producing and exporting commodities - it's also about providing equitable access to safe, nutritious and healthy food, produced sustainably for all Australians," Dr Robertson said.

"We have an intergenerational responsibility to pursue these goals vigorously," he said.

"This national stocktake provides an evidence base to guide our actions as social, cultural, environmental, and economic priorities shift.

"While Australia's wider food system is an economic and production success, generating more than \$800 billion annually and providing significant employment particularly in regional areas, the intersection of our food system with other critical goals calls for a more comprehensive way to evaluate its performance."

Australia's food system includes a range of factors from production to distribution and consumption of food and food ingredients, nutrition and health, alongside the natural and social systems that support it.

CSIRO Sustainability Research Director Larelle McMillan says food policy in Australia is currently fragmented across portfolios as diverse as agriculture, environment, industry, social services, health, transport and urban planning.

"We need to move from analysing specific parts of the food system, to



establishing coordinated reporting for important food system attributes and interactions, thus enabling connected up action for a national food system that serves all," Ms McMillan said.

The report identified three key steps to guide a systems-based approach for transformation:

- 1. Recognising the food system as an integrated whole, moving beyond a fragmented, sector-based view
- 2. Navigating responsibility across government, industry, and communities to ensure shared

accountability for sustainability, nutrition, and equity goals

 Enabling interactions across disconnected parts of the system, from farming and nutrition to policy and innovation.

Ms McMillan said a reporting system would offer valuable insights into where the food system is falling short - for example, almost a third of Australian households experience moderate or severe food insecurity each year - and where it's failing to meet the needs of all Australians.

"This can be used as a focal point to

bring together a greater diversity of voice and vision to identify pathways to sustainable, healthy and affordable food for all Australians," she said.

Towards a state of the food system report for Australia has been produced by the Food System Horizons initiative, a collaboration between CSIRO and The University of Queensland.

A key tributary to Lake George is being polluted. An incinerator will make things

Dear Editor,

I am writing to express my grave concerns regarding Veolia's acknowledgment in the Tarago Times that Allianoyonyiga Creek, a tributary of Lake George, has been polluted and is now unsuitable for consumption by livestock - potentially due to leachate from tailings dams or their own landfilling practices. Both matters are Veolia's responsibility.

I farm on the shores of the Lake, and like many locals, rely on its groundwater. This alarming situation highlights the urgent need for greater accountability by Veolia and better environmental stewardship at Woodlawn. It further calls into question Veolia's plans for a huge waste incinerator at Woodlawn, about which concerned readers should make a submission to the EPA, as described below.

The incinerator would burn Sydney's waste, concentrating chemical hazards in the ash residue, while also releasing harmful emissions into the air, posing a direct threat to the health of Tarago and Bungendore residents and the surrounding ecosystem. The fact that 660 residents have already objected to this incinerator underscores the widespread opposition to this plan - a development application that the NSW Government must scrutinise with the utmost care before making any decision.

Veolia further alerted us in the Tarago Times to a draft "NSW Waste and Circular

Infrastructure Plan" by the EPA which assumes the presence of the incinerator in the future. This prejudges and trivialises the planning process and disregards the voices of the local community, whose livelihoods and health are at stake.


I encourage all concerned residents to make a submission to the EPA via its website or wasteinfrastructureplan@epa.nsw.gov. au before 25 June 2025, asking it to remove the Woodlawn incinerator from its plan pending the development application.

In your submission, you may wish to highlight that Veolia's approach is not only environmentally reckless but also undermines the very purpose of the NSW EPA's waste levy. This levy was designed to encourage waste reduction and recycling, yet Veolia's pursuit of incineration appears to exploit a loophole in the system. Burning waste to evade the levy is counterproductive and represents a lazy and harmful approach to waste management.

We should urge the NSW EPA to amend the levy to close this loophole. The EPA should levy the INPUT to any incinerator, and not the ash output. Such a change would make incineration economically unviable, thereby encouraging recycling and waste reduction, ensuring the intent of the waste levy is upheld in practice.

Together, we can safeguard our air, as well as water in the creeks, Lake George and its aquifer

Encouragement awards went to Banjo Priddis (25m races), Shubhan Shrestha (boys), and Tillie Graf (girls), while leadership honours were awarded to Milly Ballard, Ziyad El-Aasar, Olivia Kenningham, and Jasmine Stove for their support of younger swimmers at the weekly club nights. The club also celebrated several swimmers who represented beyond school level, with appearances at ACT Championships and NSW PSSA & CHS District, Regionals & State championships.

All ages are welcome to participate at QLSC, including the grown-ups. Chad Fraser set the pace at the annual fun night to claim the 2024/25 fastest parent in the 50m freestyle event, proving the kids

aren't the only ones who know how make a splash.

Behind the scenes, volunteers were a big help. Shane Kenningham was recognised for his all-round support, from setting up and packing up, to timekeeping to barbecues. And a big thank you to everyone who helped make the season run smoothly from committee members to those who offered a hand timing or marshalling each week.

Tom Worman kicked two conversions to make the score 19-13 in favour of the local boys at half time. By then the Mudchooks had started to gain the ascendency but Cooma is a good team, and the final result was far from certain.

The second half witnessed three brilliant individual efforts from Mudchooks players which resulted in tries. Flyhalf Kyle Shand was responsible for two of them. They both started from about halfway when he cut through the Cooma line and with lots of work still to





do, beat several defenders before scoring. It was beautiful to watch.

The third - which was between the two Kyle Shand spectaculars - was scored by winger Uraia 'Woody' Rabici and although very different to Kyle's efforts was equally spectacular. Again starting from halfway but this time very close to the touchline, Woody beat a couple of tacklers but was well covered by others

Avoiding putting a foot into touch he decided to kick and chase, got to the ball but was surrounded by defenders and couldn't pick it up. He showed his soccer skills by kicking again and then it was a straight footrace to the ball which was heading to the tryline.

Woody won, getting there first just before it rolled over the dead ball line and successfully grounding it. Even the Cooma supporters applauded!

Tom Worman converted two of

these tries (all three of which are surely 'try of the year' contenders) to bring up the Mudchooks' final tally of 38 points. The Cooma boys scored two unconverted tries in the second half, but the feeling in the final 40 minutes was that the Mudchooks had things pretty much under control.

Next Saturday (21 June) is the long trip south to play reigning premiers the Jindabyne Bushpigs. The Mudchooks won their first encounter with the Bushpigs quite comfortably early in the season but Jindabyne is a team which should never be underestimated, especially on home turf.

Tupua takes two as Whites produce most dominant win of their season

The Queanbeyan Whites have extended their winning streak to five straight games in an emphatic fashion, with the BentSpoke Premier 15s competition side dismantling the Canberra Royals 36-7 in front of their home crowd at Campese Field last Saturday.

The Whites have been brimming with confidence over the last month, producing some very impressive victories that have managed to overshadow their slow start to the season, and there were no signs of this momentum slowing down as Queanbeyan produced their most dominant win of the season, against a Royals side who had been previously beaten by the Whites back in round 7 (17-

Royals would have been hopeful that they could respond with a strong performance but instead ran into a red-hot attacking display by the hosts, as the Whites produced a stunning six tries, whilst the Royals only managed one consolation five-pointer.

There were perhaps no bigger attacking threats for Queanbeyan than the double act of Jackie Eneliko and Rosina Tupua who were instrumental in point scoring for the Whites and giving the team their

largest winning margin of the season thus far. Eneliko was strong with the boot, managing to convert two of Queanbeyan's tries in the 39th and 48th minute, but also provided the definitive turning point of the game when crossed over to score a try earlier in the 18th minute. The try kickstarted a dominant thirty-minute period for the Whites, as the next try was scored through Rosina Tupua in the 24th minute to extend the lead to ten points, before Tupua quickly snagged another one just three minutes later to secure her double and give the Whites a strong lead going into the break.

It didn't take long for the flurry of points to continue in the second half, as the Whites only had to wait three minutes for their next points. This time, they were in again through hooker Clementine Utumapu. Just when the home fans thought the scoring had finally slowed down, interchange player Losalini Tinaivodre gave them another reason to cheer as she went on to score another five-pointer in the 47th minute, in addition to converting another try scored by Yvonne Vuata.

After producing some incredibly hard-fought victories over the last few weeks, the 29-point victory felt like a just reward for the



playing roster and coaching staff, with the weeks of hard work culminating in the side's most complete performance of the season. The win will sees the Whites hold on to third spot on the ladder for another week as they stay in touching distance with second placed Tuggeranong ViQueens, who sit just one win ahead.

The Whites will get the chance to close that gap even further, when they face Royals for the third time in a

month this weekend.

In other action last weekend, Queanbeyan's third and fourth grade men's teams both travelled down to Simon Poidevin Rugby Park in Goulburn to take on the Goulburn Dirty Reds in a Saturday afternoon double header.

Despite some hard-fought contests, both games unfortunately ended in defeat for the Whites, with fourth-grade side losing

31-26 despite a resilient performance, whilst thirdgrade side experienced their first loss of the season going down 31-12.

All six Queanbeyan teams will be returning to action this weekend with an away trip to Phillip Oval, in what is shaping to be a true festival of footy for the club's fans.
