Shop local win big: \$8,000 prize pool launched in Queanbeyan

The popular Shop & Win campaign has this week launched in Queanbeyan for the first time, to provide support to CBD businesses during the upcoming construction works on Monaro Street.

The Shop & Win promotion is part of a wider, integrated marketing campaign for Queanbeyan that includes digital advertising, social media promotion, local business profiles and on-the-ground signage to support commercial activity and encourage continued customer foot traffic through the area.

As Queanbeyan continues its transformation to realise the vision of the CBD Master Plan, the Shop & Win campaign provides a perfect opportunity for the community to support the economy, local jobs and businesses, and possibly walk away with a significant prize in time for a pre-Christmas shopping spree.

Vale Don Woodford

Born in Cobargo 24.07.1933 at a whopping 12 ½ pound - passed away in Canberra 04.07.2025.

Formerly of Bungendore, Canberra, Cobargo & Yowrie

Don is survived by his wife Mary (married just shy of 71 years), son Colin and daughter Helen.

He came from humble beginnings. Being schooled in Yowrie for only four (4) years, then was to board in Cobargo to continue on, but as the family was unable to afford the board, that is when Don's schooling ceased. With the limited formal education Don received it is a testament as to his strength of character and determination and a whole lot of hard work, as to what someone can achieve in their lifetime

At the age of approximately ten (10) years, Don took up working alongside his father & uncles honing his bush skills - mustering stock in the mountains: now known as Wadbilliga National Park, farming, milking cows, Eucalyptus cutting & distilling, sleeper cutting (no

chainsaws in those days only an axe and crosscut saw) and butchering which he learnt for a short time in Sydney during the mid-1950's.

The family resided in Canberra for approximately 10 years with Don being a bottle merchant, barman and butcher, before the move to Bungendore, where he has been for the past 52 years, apart from the last six (6) months residing in an Aged Care facility.

The move to Bungendore in 1973 was because Don and Mary purchased Ryan's General Store (from Stan and Belle Ryan), where Gunna Doo Bakery is today. They altered the inside of the store overnight into a Supermarket with aisles for people to do their own shopping, without the storekeeper fetching the goods on their behalf.

The supermarket opened from 8am to 7pm, seven (7) days a week (without closing for lunch) as every other business in town still closed for lunch, apart from the Hotels, this was a new era

for Bungendore at the time. Next to the supermarket was a closed section of the building, where it had at some point been a hardware store as there were many nuts and bolts etc. remaining on shelves. Don saw this as an opportunity to open his own butcher shop that he had so dreamed of doing. This section is currently vacant, though renovations are going ahead, where Gibraltar Cuts formerly tenanted, next to Gunna Doo Bakery.

Don opened the butcher shop in 1974 with his son Colin going into partnership. In December 1989, the butcher shop relocated to across the road, opposite the Lake George Hotel, to new and bigger premises as the town's population was starting to expand.

The supermarket that had new proprietors by this stage, too moved to the new premises next to the butcher shop (this is where Bungendore's Post Office is situated today). Don eventually stepped back from butchering to


pursue his next interest of contracting as a bobcat operator. This enabled him the time to attend to his farm that was a lifetime passion, where he bred the stock to supply the meat for the butcher shop in which Colin continued with until his retirement. The butcher shop remains there today under Darmody's ownership.

Don continued his farming interests almost up to the point of entry to the Aged Care facility, with the assistance of his family in his later years.

Don may be out of sight, but our memories will live on. He passed away on Friday 4 July 2025 at approximately 8.45pm, in time before 'last drinks' would be called.

The family wishes to extend their sincere heartfelt gratitude to the many people that attended Don's funeral service, and for the flowers, cards and condolence messages received during this difficult time.

Queanbeyan Museum News: History Week: Sept 6 -14

Queanbeyan and District Museum

Every week celebrates the history of Queanbeyan at the Queanbeyan and District Museum!

The theme this year is Water Stories and there are many stories related to the river.

The Queanbeyan River, named after an Indigenous word, thought to mean 'Clear Waters' is the life source which sparked the development of Queanbeyan and the surrounding area. Nowadays it is hard to imagine men fishing for trout in the 1890s when John Gale offered a reward 2s6d for any specimen of trout taken in the Queanbeyan or Molonglo Rivers or swimming carnivals being held in the river in 1921 while the town waited... and waited for a swimming pool.

However, many of us can remember the river flooding at different times. One of the greatest floods occurred 100 years ago when more than 85 inches (2159 millimetres) fell in a day and a half. The Queanbeyan Age reported on May 28th, 1925, that "five men drowned while numerous people were rescued including an elderly woman who spent the night sitting on a sideboard listening to the waters lapping the interior of her home and the various articles of furniture floating

"Waves several feet high beat furiously against the town bridge and backed up innumerable streets. Down the rapids came all manner of things, including horses, cattle, pigs, farm implements, a piano, a wheelbarrow, wreckage from houses, and all manner of timber



and debris."

"A two-storey brick house occupied by Mr. McGuinness, containing eight rooms, with everything, lock, stock and barrel, was hurled down the rapids, and in the morning only a tank leaning at an angle of 45 degrees marked the spot where the house once stood. During the night the suspension bridge which spanned the river a few hundred vards from the main street was completely carried away.'

This is one of the many stories told through the objects, photographs and ephemera at the Queanbeyan Museum. During History Week:

Scams Awareness Week: 25 to 29 August

National Anti-Scam Centre calls for continued action this Scams Awareness Week as scam losses trend up at \$175M

Australians reported more than 108,000 scams and financial losses of about \$175 million to the National Anti-Scam Centre's Scamwatch service in the first half of 2025, with fake websites, online advertisements, and contact through social media criminals' preferred methods of reaching people.

This Scams Awareness Week, the National Anti-Scam Centre is joining together with government, business, community groups, consumer protection groups, educational organisations and individuals to reinforce the three simple actions that can help protect Australians: 'Stop. Check. Protect' before clicking, sharing, or paying.

It comes as Scamwatch received 108,305 reports about scams in the first six months of 2025, which is a 24 per cent decrease in reports compared to the same period last year. While total number of reports are down, reports involving losses have increased significantly.

The \$174.8 million reported lost is a 26 per cent increase compared to the first half of 2024. There has been a 40.5 percent increase in reports involving losses and this is higher for some demographic groups: about 44 per cent among individuals who speak English as a second language, and 55.3 percent for First Nations Australians compared to the same period in 2024.

The 2025 losses still represent but a

39 per cent decrease compared to the equivalent period in 2023. Financial losses to scams peaked in 2022 and early 2023. The average reported loss was \$12,212 - a decrease of about 10 per cent.

Losses to phishing scams were \$19.5 million in 2025, driven in part by a rise in cryptocurrency impersonation scams. 14,235 reports involved losses to crypto scams. These scams closely mirror bank impersonation tactics and have resulted in significant financial harm to victims.

This Scams Awareness Week, follow our advice to stay safe from scams:

STOP. Always take a moment before giving your money or personal information to anyone. Scammers will create a sense of urgency to pressure you into acting quickly. Don't rush to make decisions about money or sharing personal details.

What to do:

- Say no, hang up, or delete suspicious messages
- Take time to think before responding to unexpected requests
- Don't let anyone pressure you into immediate action
- Trust your instincts if something feels wrong

CHECK. Make sure the person or organisation you're dealing with is real. Scammers pretend to be from organisations you know and trust. Always verify who you're really dealing with before taking any action.

What to do:

- Contact the organisation directly using phone numbers or email addresses you find on their official website or app
- Research investment opportunities or offers through official sources like ASIC
- Get a second opinion from family, friends, or professionals.

PROTECT. Act quickly it something feels wrong. The sooner you act, the better you can protect yourself and others from scammers.

What to do:

- Contact your bank immediately if you think you've lost money or shared financial details
- Contact IDCARE (www.idcare.org)
- or call 1800 595 160) if you want support to recover - they can help you create a plan to the limit damage of scams
- Report to Scamwatch (www. scamwatch.gov.au) to help protect others
- Report to police (www.cyber.gov.au)
- Change passwords and security details if you think they've been compromised
- Monitor your bank statements and credit reports for unusual activity
- Report the scam to the impersonated organisation and platform where the scam is happening



What would you do with a \$1 million inheritance?

For many Australians, receiving a large inheritance is a once-in-a-lifetime event.

While it can bring enormous opportunity, it can also raise tough questions: Do we pay off the mortgage? Should we invest? How do we balance today's lifestyle with tomorrow's security?

What you should do really depends on your situation.

Let's look at how I would help one couple approach it.

Sarah and James are both 40, living in Sydney with their two children, aged 8 and 10. They earn \$140,000 each and have a \$500,000 mortgage. After tax they bring home \$200,000. With mortgage repayments of around \$40,000 and living expenses of \$120,000 they can save about \$40,000 a year. Life is busy but they are comfortable.

Their Nana left them a \$1 million

inheritance and they both have \$200,000 in super.

Step 1: Stop and assess the situation.

It is important to understand what they want. For this, let's assume they want to have the flexibility of being able to retire in the next 15 years and build a family legacy.

Step 2: Clear the Mortgage

Wiping out the \$500,000 mortgage leaves them with an extra \$40,000 a year in savings. And more importantly, no debt that isn't tax deductible.

Step 3: Put in place a safety net

Put \$60,000 in a high-interest savings account. This is their emergency fund – allows them to cover at least six months of living expenses.

Step 4: Build long-term wealth tax effectively

With the debt gone and their safety net in place, Sarah and James turn

to investing for the future. They see this investment as more about their children than themselves and as such take a long-term view.

They borrow \$500,000 and invest this and the remaining \$460,000 of the inheritance in a diversified portfolio of Exchange Traded Funds. At 8% growth and reinvesting the dividends, the ETF portfolio (less the debt) will be worth more than \$2.5 million in 15 years' time.

Further, they have held this in a discretionary trust, as that will allow them to divert future dividends to whoever is the most tax advantaged. It won't make a big difference straight away, but over time (especially once the kids are 18), there are significant advantages.

Step 5: Maximise Super contributions

Their employer is contributing \$16,800 into super already, but they can still put in more.

Firstly, contribute up to the maximum concessional super cap. Currently it is \$30,000. Therefore, between them they can contribute \$26,400 a year and claim it as a tax deduction. This will save them over \$4,500 in tax a year. In 20 years, they will have around \$2 million in super. Each.

Secondly, put the rest of their surplus funds into super as a non-concessional contribution. The reason for this is any earnings on this is taxed at 15% (instead of their marginal tax rate of 37%).

Assuming they only put \$20,000 a year extra into super each, in 20 years' time this would give them an extra \$650,000 each.

In 20 years, between them they could have \$5.3 million in super. Even better, under the current rules this would be tax free.

Step 6: Review their insurance and estate plans

There is now a lot more at stake. It is important that they have the

right insurance (which could even be less than they have now) and their estate plans are up to date and deal with the money tax effectively.

The Bottom Line

Receiving a \$1 million inheritance at age 40 is an incredible opportunity. Don't waste it.

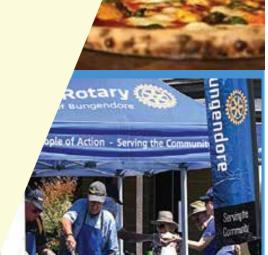

Soil testing pasture paddocks - spring is the time to act!

In any agricultural production system where produce is grown and sold off farm, nutrients are being removed from the soil. For the system to remain sustainable these nutrients must be replenished.

Spring is when many pasture types across the region move into their most productive state. It is also a key time to take stock of your soil health and in particular your soil nutrient status. It is the time when a pastures demand for nutrients is at its

Soil testing is a useful tool to determine various important soil parameters that are key to improving pasture

productivity. When sampling in line with peak pasture supply, soil testing will inform whether nutrient levels can support maximum growth.

Annual monitoring of soil nutrient status over successive years becomes a powerful tool to help guide decisions around fertiliser use. It will help address questions like should I change fertiliser rates on certain country (i.e. increase or reduce rates), or what are my critical nutrient targets across different parts of the

Spring is also a time of year when soils are usually reliably moist and easy to sample. This helps to ensure soil cores hold together to the necessary depth (0-10 cm cores usual sampling depth for ongoing nutrient monitoring) and thereby improving sampling accuracy. It is important to obtain a representative soil sample of the paddock or area in question. Important factors that help to achieve this include taking a minimum of 30 cores/ sample, keeping a record of the transect followed to allow future sampling to occur in the same area and always sampling at a similar time of

It is usually not reasonable to soil sample the whole farm but rather choose areas/paddocks that are most important to your production system.

A standard package to assess the soil nutrient status under pastures should

include parameters such as pH(CaCl2), plant available Phosphorus (P), Sulfur and Potassium, Phosphorus Buffer Index (PBI), Cation Exchange Capacity, **Electrical Conductivity and** Total Organic Carbon.

Phosphorus is commonly a major nutritional soil constraint to pasture production. It is an essential nutrient playing a key role in early root formation and in energy pathways throughout the plant. There are many different methods for measuring plant available P however, the most widely used in NSW is the P Colwell test. When this test is combined with a measurement of PBI it is then possible to determine where your soil is currently

sitting relative to levels required for maximum pasture production.

Of course, other nutrients are also critical to pasture production which is why soil should be tested for a range of parameters (as mentioned above). There is commonly a nutrient hierarchy supporting pasture growth and a soil test will help to provide a snapshot of the nutrient balance present.

Fallen timber: how does it really help?



Australia's woodlands and forests naturally produce dead and fallen timber. Our unique wildlife has evolved to take advantage of this is many ways and the landscape too was moulded using this resource to manage soils, waterways and nutrient cycling. But when you see it on your property, you might think it

looks messy, is hard to work around, or is just firewood. However, fallen timber is more valuable to your farm ecosystem than it first appears, offering numerous benefits for free!

Managing water runoff

leaf litter naturally slow water movement, allowing it to infiltrate the soil better. If there is a healthy invertebrate population





above and below the soil, then soils are likely to have good structure and aeration, and this can improve the rate of water infiltration. That's good for farms and biodiversity.

You can use fallen timber to help manage water runoff in desired areas of the farm. Fallen tree trunks, branches and twigs (and even old untreated timber posts) can be placed in gullies or areas with low groundcover along the contour. They will slow down water movement, allowing it to drop sediments and seed, improving soil moisture locally and encouraging plants to germinate. With additional land management strategies, this can help create productive patches in the landscape that boost biodiversity and landscape resilience.

Invertebrates: the unsung heroes

Invertebrates like beetles, ants, moths, spiders, and worms play a crucial role in breaking down dead wood and plant material, kickstarting nutrient cycling in the soil. This process

supports plants that feed livestock and creates a rich natural food web involving frogs, lizards, birds, and more. Invertebrates make up 95% of all species in Australia and are essential for maintaining healthy ecosystems on farms.

Benefits of invertebrates

- · decomposes organic material
- · nutrient cycling for new plant growth
- · crop pollination
- · soil aeration by worms, termites, ants and beetles
- · enhances water infiltration
- supports other animals that help control plant pests like predatory insects, birds, bats and frogs
- · soil moisture retention.

Do you have a farm biosecurity plan?

If you already have a farm biosecurity plan, now's a great time to review and update it. And if you haven't created one yet, it's a good opportunity to start planning and protecting your property.

A biosecurity plan is a great tool to help you identify the risks on your farm and document how you will manage them. Following a biosecurity plan helps to prevent diseases, weeds and pests from impacting your land.

Plans can be tailored to suit your specific situation and biosecurity risks. They're not just for large livestock producers smallholders and peri-urban landowners can benefit too. It is important that you periodically review your biosecurity management

plan to ensure it is relevant and current.

If you have sheep, cattle or goats and buy or sell livestock, you'll need to be Livestock Production Assurance (LPA) accredited. As part of that accreditation, a biosecurity plan is required. This accreditation enables you to have access to LPA-approved National Vendor Declarations (NVDs) that are a mandatory requirement for buying and selling livestock. If you don't have a farm biosecurity plan in place, templates are available at www. farmbiosecurity.com.au/ toolkit/planner

Recovering pastures from feral pig damage

The impact of feral pigs across the region this winter has been significant. In pursuit for high quality feed, they have been digging up paddocks to access grubs in the topsoil, and with the heightened numbers of red headed cockchafer larvae this year, they are having a feast!

Quantifying the cost of pig damage on your property is multi factored. Firstly, there's the direct, visual impact to pastures. The cost to establish a new improved pasture is more than \$500/ha. Added to that is the opportunity costs from loss of livestock production due to having the pasture out of use, accentuated by being at a time of year when feed is most limiting.

For example, 20ha of pasture damaged to the point of needing replacement can cost more than \$10,000 plus lost stock production. If a control program that prevents the damage from occurring costs \$5,000 (e.g. a trap, some grain, and your time), that investment equates to a 100% ROI (return on investment).

Pastures uprooted by pigs are not necessarily lost. Given the damage typically occurs over winter when conditions are cool and wet, there is capacity for plants to recover and re-establish.

To promote the recovery of upturned paddocks, it is essential to act promptly to get plant roots back in contact with soil before they dry out and die off. This can be done by running a set of

heavy harrows or seed drill over the affected area to break up and distribute the clods. This will also help to level the area making it smoother to access later.

This winter, a successful recovery was achieved by using a seed drill with coulter discs on the front and harrows behind. No additional seed or fertiliser were added.

The coulters were able to cut up the larger clods which were then spread evenly by the seeder points (set to just skim the surface) and harrow tines. The damaged area recovered and became productive again in just a couple of weeks.

Recovery will be improved by ensuring there is good soil fertility and a healthy pasture base. Additional seed, like a quick growing ryegrass and/or clover,



and an application of nitrogen fertiliser may also help to promote growth and cover any remaining bare areas.

Feral pigs are not a short-term problem, with numbers expected to rise each year. Even when no damage is visible, pigs may still be present, feeding elsewhere on the property or in the region. Proactive management of feral pigs is

becoming essential and developing a pest management plan including baiting and trapping is now a key part of standard farming practice.

Weed to watch - Boneseed

Alicia Kaylock, Senior NRM Advisor

Boneseed is serious threat to our native ecosystems on both private and public land. It is a woody, evergreen shrub from South Africa that was originally imported as a garden plant and later used for soil stabilisation before escaping cultivation. It forms dense thickets that smother native vegetation, alter habitat structure, and displace food sources for native fauna.

What does it look like?

- upright, woody shrub (2-3 m)
- dull green, elliptic leaves with irregular serrations
- yellow, daisy-like flowers with 5-8 petals mostly present from late winter to mid-spring
- round, smooth seeds that are bone-coloured when dry
- seedlings are covered in a white cottony down.

How does it spread?

Boneseed seeds prolifically. A mature plant can produce

up to 50,000 seeds a year. Birds and feral animals eat the fruit and spread the seeds in their droppings. Seed can also be dispersed by water, in contaminated sand/soil, on machinery and in dumped garden

Where might you find it?

Boneseed prefers areas with



winter rainfall and free draining soils. It can invade undisturbed native ecosystems. Look for it in woodlands, forests and heathlands on your property or in your local parks and reserves. You might also find it along roadsides, under powerline easements or other areas where it could have been spread by vehicles.

What should you do if you find it?

Boneseed is currently regulated under a Control Order. If you think you have found boneseed, you must notify your local council biosecurity weeds officer or the NSW Biosecurity Helpline 1800 680 244.

To avoid accidentally damaging a TSR, we are asking neighboring landholders to contact Local Land Services to discuss proposed works and keep risks to TSRs to a minimum.

Doing so will help protect our TSRs,

which not only support agricultural activities but also play a key role in supporting biodiversity and threatened species.

Across the south east LLS promotes a balance of TSR use for production, social, cultural and environmental outcomes and are continuously working to maintain and improve the land's natural resources.

Our community has a lot of different waste needs and services, and this draft document sets out our approach to improving those initiatives and developing new ones. As a Council, waste management is a significant element of our service delivery, and that's why we need your input to make sure we're getting it right. From changes to our food organics and garden organics (FOGO) program to expanding our waste education initiatives, there are a range of issues that depend on your feedback to create real, impactful changes. We have started a two-year trial of free self-haul waste vouchers. These vouchers will make it easier and more affordable to dispose of bulky and household waste. Rural residents, who don't have access to kerbside collections, can access up to 16 vouchers per year, enabling them to dispose of waste in smaller amounts or combine vouchers for larger items. Urban residents can access up to two vouchers per year which they can choose to use instead of kerbside bulky waste collections. This trial program will work alongside our existing kerbside collection service. The vouchers are available through the QPRC Waste Info app. Residents can use their self-haul waste vouchers to dispose of bulky waste at the Bungendore and Braidwood Waste Transfer Stations, and general waste at the Macs Reef, Captains Flat, and Nerriga Waste Transfer Stations. Residents are responsible for safely and securely transporting their waste to their chosen facility. Learn more at www.qprc.nsw. gov.au/self-haul-waste-vouchers




