Samsara Eco opens first plant to scale circular plastics

Australian biotech innovator, Samsara regulations are helping to clear the Eco, recently opened its first plant, representing a significant milestone in the fight against plastic waste. The new plant will exponentially increase the company's ability to produce virginidentical, low-carbon circular materials like recycled nylon 6.6 and polyester with broad applications across apparel, packaging and automotives, at scale.

Located in Jerrabomberra, the new headquarters and plant houses EosEco, Samsara Eco's breakthrough enzymatic recycling technology. The technology uses Al-crafted enzymes to break down mixed plastics destined for landfill into recycled raw materials, ready for brands to incorporate into their next product line. The facility also houses expanded enzyme production facilities, allowing Samsara Eco to further build out its proprietary Al-powered enzyme discovery and development platform to find recycling solutions for a broader range of plastics

"The opening of Jerrabomberra is a proud milestone for us and the broader circular economy. In just four years, we've scaled from bench research through to pilot, demonstration, and now our first plant. This is a true tipping point for circularity, shifting circular materials from early-stage innovation to mainstream reality.

"Brand demand and supportive new

path forward. Our new facility will help brands deliver circularity with the capacity to produce the equivalent of hundreds of thousands of garments annually," said Paul Riley, CEO and founder of Samsara Eco.

The circular materials made at Jerrabomberra will feature in upcoming product lines for global brands like lululemon, as well as pilot programs and trials with brands across textiles, automotive and packaging. The facility will also host world-first research including finding recycling solutions for the likes of spandex with The LYCRA Company, and our collaboration with Deakin University's Recycling and Clean Energy Commercialisation Hub, part of the Australian Government's Trailblazer Universities Program.

Today, only 10% of plastics are recycled and less than 1% of textiles are recycled into new textiles, perpetuating a linear economy. Samsara Eco aims to rewrite those numbers by recycling the unrecyclable to keep high-value materials out of the

"This isn't just about building a plant. It's about building a circular future where materials don't have an endof-life. Instead, they are infinitely recycled, reducing the world's reliance on finite resources," continued Riley.

Jerrabomberra provides a runway

for Samsara Eco's first nylon 6,6 commercial plant, which is being designed with engineering partner, KBR and due to open in Asia in 2028. The 20,000 tonne facility will be the first of a fleet of international commercial facilities, which will use Samsara Eco's EosEco technology to turn waste into virgin-identical raw materials.

"Our Jerrabomberra plant marks a significant milestone in Australia's advanced manufacturing and circular economy journey," added Riley. "Our technology supports Australia's netzero targets while driving economic growth, resilience, and productivity. We're creating an entirely new industry to unlock major export opportunities and bring new skills to market, while also helping to position Australia as a leader in circular technology and a global exporter of circular materials.

"We're grateful for the support we've received from our global investors including Main Sequence and Temasek, as well as the local community, who have supported us every step of the way to make Jerrabomberra a reality.

Seven charged, multiple guns seized during cross border investigation into alleged stabbing - Queanbeyan

NSW and ACT detectives have charged seven men and have seized multiple firearms as part of a cross border investigation into a double stabbing in Queanbeyan earlier this

About 1.10pm on Friday 8 August 2025, police were called to a business on Crawford Street, Queanbeyan following to reports of a brawl.

On arrival officers were advised that two men - aged 26 and 29 - had been taken to Queanbeyan Hospital with serious stab injuries.

Detectives attached to Monaro Police District established a crime scene and set up Strike Force Flomore to investigate the incident.

Following extensive investigations, on Wednesday 3 September 2025, seven search warrants were executed across New South Wales and the ACT.

The NSW searches, which were conducted by Monaro PD detectives assisted by Monaro Region

Enforcement Squad and SCC Raptor South at homes in Queanbeyan and Crestwood.

During the searches detectives located and seized three pistols and one disassembled Glock pistol.

Two men - aged 24 and 30 - were arrested at one property in Queanbeyan, with a third man - aged 27 - arrested at a home in Crestwood. A fourth man aged 25 - was also arrested at a home in Queanbeyan with all four being taken to Queanbeyan Police Station.

Four search warrants were also executed in the ACT, with assistance of various **ACT Policing criminal** investigation and AFP specialist operation officers.

During those searches three men - aged 20, 27, 33 - were arrested and taken to the ACT Watch House at City Station before appearing at the ACT Magistrates Court and being extradited to Queanbeyan, NSW.

All seven men were charged with cause wounding/ grievous bodily harm to person with intent to murder

(two counts), wound person with intent to cause grievous bodily harm (two counts) and take person in company with intent commit serious indictable offence. An eighth male will be charged when he appears in court later this month.

The 24-year-old was also charged with possess prohibited drug (two counts), possess/attempt to, prescribed restricted substance, and possess or use a prohibited weapon without permit.

The 30-year-old man was also charged with recklessly deal with proceeds of crime less than \$5,000, possess unregistered firearm and possess prohibited drug.

The 25-year-old man was also charged with destroy/ damage property in public disorder more than \$2,000.

The seven arrested on 3 September 2025 have been refused bail to appear before Bail Division Local Court 3 on Thursday 4 September 2025.

Investigations under Strike Force Flomore continue.

New era of transparency for council meetings

New rules for council meetings will soon be in place as the NSW Government spearheads a change of culture to boost transparency and community confidence in local

A new Model Code of Meeting Practice for local councils has been recently released and will come into effect in councils from 1 January 2026.

The changes to the Model Meeting Code are part of the broader set of reforms the NSW Government is progressing to improve confidence, trust and transparency across NSW

Changes to the code have simplified the way meetings are conducted, ensure disorder is dealt with more effectively, that councillors make decisions in full view of the communities they represent, and dignity is returned to council chambers.

All councils will need to adopt a code of meeting practice that contains the mandatory provisions of the updated Model Meeting Code by 31 December

Key changes to the Model Code of Meeting Practice include:

- · Preventing councils from holding private councillor briefing sessions to discuss matters that should be considered in the public domain at committee and council meetings (unless they are confidential)
- · Encouraging councils to hold public forums preferably before committee

meetings, or if they choose council meetings, to enable community engagement in local matters

- · Expanding the powers of the mayor to remove councillors from meetings for acts of disorder
- Expanding the powers of the mayor to remove members of the public if they disrupt council meetings
- · Requiring information considered at closed meetings to be made public after it ceases to be confidential
- Requiring councils to give reasons when making decisions on planning matters that depart from staff recommendations (as recommended by ICAC)
- Promoting neutrality in the role of the general manager
- · Requiring council and committee meetings to be live streamed to give the community and media access to council decision making, and to require those videos to be public for at least the rest of the council term, or 12 months in the case of a meeting in an election year

The changes to the Meeting Code are part of a broader suite of reforms by the NSW Government to improve conduct and accountability and rebuild public trust in councils.

A new Code of Conduct for councillors is being finalised as well as associated legislative changes, which will see significant changes to how misconduct is dealt with in local government.

Minister for Local Government Ron

Hoenig said, "The council chamber should be a place of dignity, where debate and decision making takes place in full view of the community.

"Making decisions on behalf of communities is the very role of a councillor, and all councillors should never lose sight of this core responsibility.

"These changes should ensure that, in a council chamber or committee meeting, mechanisms are in place to prevent the derailing of meetings and overshadowing the important work of local government.

"Council and committee meetings must be effective, transparent and genuine, and strive for outcomes to benefit the community.

"Under the new code, mayors should be given the power to take immediate action against disorderly councillors. This should lessen the need for councils to resort to the broken code of conduct process and instead address misbehaviour immediately in the council chamber.

"I know not everyone will agree with these changes, but most people in this state would agree action is necessary to improve transparency, increase community confidence and faith in local government.

"They will make councillors more visibly in control of their councils to ensure they - as democratically elected representatives of their communities drive the vision for their local area."

Construction to begin on new schools in Bungendore and Googong

Bungendore High School

The Bungendore community can celebrate a long-awaited milestone, with work soon to commence on the town's first permanent high school on Birchfield Drive. Scheduled to open on Day 1, Term 1, 2027, the school will feature 26 modern classrooms, three support classrooms, administration and staff facilities, a library, hall and canteen, sports field, and an agricultural plot. Kiss-and-drop zones will also be included to make drop-offs safer and easier.

The temporary Bungendore High School will continue operating during construction.

Member for Monaro and Minister for Skills, TAFE and Tertiary Education, Steve Whan, said the start of construction was "long overdue" and marked the beginning of a new chapter for Bungendore families.

"I particularly want to thank Deputy Premier Prue Car for cutting through the issues that stalled this project, and the Bungendore High School staff led by Principal Melissa Giddins, along with the P&C, parents and students, who have shown how much this school means to the community."

Principal Melissa Giddins said breaking ground on the new site was "the start of a great new chapter that's going to be



beneficial for our students, staff and families."

Googong: New High School, Primary School and Preschool

At the same time, Googong families are celebrating the start of construction on their new public high school, which will be master-planned for up to 2,000 students and is also due to open in 2027.

The high school will open initially with capacity for 700 students, offering 26 classrooms, three support classrooms, specialist facilities for science, performing

arts and hospitality, wood and metal workshops, a library, multipurpose sports courts, a hall and canteen, a sports field, and an agricultural plot.

In addition, the NSW Government has announced a brand new public primary school and preschool to be built alongside the high school. Due for completion in 2028, the new primary school will accommodate over 650 students in 28 classrooms, while the preschool will cater for up to 120 children each week.

This will be Googong's second public primary school, after Googong Public School opened in 2023, and reflects faster-than-expected enrolment growth in the area.

Acting Minister for Education and Early Learning, Courtney Houssos, said the decision to build a new school, rather than simply expand the existing one, showed the Government was planning for the community's future.

"By co-locating the high school, new primary school and preschool

on the same site, families will benefit from easier school drop-offs and a guarantee that their children will have access to world-class education close to home," Ms Houssos said.

Googong Public School Principal Rebekah Lindsay said the new facilities would create "a supportive environment where students can grow academically and personally, helping every student to succeed and reach their full potential."





Coding comes to Bungendore these Spring Holidays

This October school holidays, Bungendore students will have the chance to dive into the world of coding through a brandnew initiative: CodeWarrior Code Camps, hosted at the Carrington Inn.

The camps are designed for both primary (Years 3-6) and high school students (Years 7-12), giving them the opportunity to build games, create apps, and explore coding in a fun, hands-on way - or, for those with existing experience, to level up their skills.

Each camp day runs from 9am to 4pm, and students will be guided by experienced developers who also have classroomteaching experience.

Behind the initiative are two dads from Sydney's Hills District, Simon Forwood and Philip Senger. Both bring decades of professional experience in software development and leadership, having held senior positions at organisations including Shopify, IBM, Macquarie Bank, and Infomedia. Their shared passion is making coding accessible, creative, and enjoyable for young people.

So why Bungendore? Simon explains: "I've had both family and long-time friends

living in Bungendore, and in conversations with the Carrington Inn team the idea came together. The Carrington's conference space is an ideal venue, with an excellent teaching environment and great audio-visual capabilities, and we're excited to collaborate in bringing this opportunity to the community."

CodeWarrior camps are a brand-new initiative launching this spring in both Sydney's Hills District and Bungendore. Alongside the student programs, CodeWarrior is also looking to engage senior high school students who are passionate

about coding to join as paid guides. These roles provide a chance for teenagers to gain real-world experience, share their skills, work alongside senior developers in a supportive environment and get paid for it.

The camps focus first on building strong foundations in coding, problem-solving skills, and confidence with core programming languages, so students can make the most of new technologies like AI.

On time, space and whatever

Did you know that Einstein's time, space and matter is all theories of Special and General Relativity don't work at the quantum level? No, nor did your correspondent. But when I found out it set me thinking: what's this quantum level all about and what's going on there? It turns out the quantum level is the atomic and sub-atomic level of the universe i.e. the invisible universe. You can't see it but with the right equipment - like electron microscopes and Large Hadron Colliders - you can detect it. To appreciate the rest of this thesis it's important to know that in the visible universe (a) matter occupies physical space and has mass (b) time is a non spatial continuum to the future and (c) space is space, OK? What follows is mostly conjecture. It posits

the same thing. So put your brain under the seat and come with me for the ride

Let's start with the Big Bang which created the universe, according to astrophysicists/ cosmologists (a free ride with Spacex if you can tell the difference). It is a fundamental principle of science that matter cannot be created or destroyed. (Thank you Antoine Lavoisier, 1785.) But if matter cannot be created how did the universe come about? Answer = matter always existed at the quantum level. If not, no BB - a reaction between subatomic particles causing the massive explosion giving birth to the visible universe. What space did the newlycreated universe occupy? Answer= a space which must have existed before the BB. (The notion that the BB created its own space is a causal absurdity.) It follows that this space, which we shall call the Omniverse, already contained the compound of space, time and matter which formed our infant and expanding universe. It also follows that the quantum level is actually the Omniverse or contained within it. This opens the possibility of universes additional to our own, formed by other BBs within the Omniverse.

The existence of the Omniverse is not only an intelligible supposition but a logical necessity if we accept the premise of a cosmic singularity such as the BB. It is also a convenient answer to the questions: what are eternity and infinity? Once you've accepted the infinite size of the Omniverse it

is easier to contemplate something that always was and always will be. Furthermore, any scientific questions about how and when the Omniverse was created are not only absurd but futile: you are left with the prospect of a succession of even Bigger Bangs going back forever. In the Omniverse time, space and matter are meaningless individual concepts. They are just part of an eternal entity and have no existence separate to that entity. Like matter in our visible universe they can neither be created nor destroyed. All the time/ space/matter we will ever need is already there and always was. As a unity they may be the Dark Matter that science is seeking. This thesis holds up even if we reject the BB theory. The universe simply becomes the



Omniverse which, of course, didn't need a BB: it was always there.

I acknowledge that this theory lacks supporting mathematics: science demands empirical evidence, and in this case there is no equivalent to E=Mc2. Maybe the Year 12s at Bungendore High can help me out. Meanwhile, when you are sitting in the

A rare, good news story, although you'll still have to wait a month to get the pension.

In early 2024, we brought you a story about older Australians applying for the Age Pension were increasingly out of pocket as the time it took Centrelink to process their applications and payments were blowing out month on month.

By February last year, Centrelink had a backlog of nearly 34,000 claims and the waiting time had blown out to an average 84 days.

Phone waiting time had also blown out to 30 minutes, sparking the comment from then Government Services Minister, Bill Shorten: "We've got a backlog of over a million payments," he told the ABC. "I really want to get waiting times on phone calls

"But let's give it the next six months. I don't expect new staff to produce miracles."

According to Centrelink, reasons for delays in claim processing include applicants not supplying all the necessary information or having complex financial affairs that need to be appropriately assessed through third parties.

The "new staff" Mr Shorten referred to were, at that time a proposal to recruit 3,000 additional staff to bring the logjam under control.

The good news

It's taken longer than six months, but it appears the extra public servants have got their feet under the desk and have contributed to chipping away at the waittime figures.

The average time to process an Age Pension has been declining:

Jan-Mar 2024 84 days Apr-June 2024 74 days Jul-Sep 2024 49 days Oct-Dec 2024 32 days

See the latest figures in the box, right.

In other good news, Commonwealth Seniors Health Card average processing time has also dropped - from 50 days to 22 days. Processing times for the Home Equity Access Scheme have gone from 76 days to 56 days

Those of you planning to apply for the pension will note that there is still a waiting time of more than a month, and you should factor that into your application for the pension.

Whether this improvement can be sustained is uncertain given the hullabaloo around how to pay for the \$8.5 billion dollar Medicare bulk-billing funding promise by the government

and opposition.

The status of the public servants employed to address wait times could be uncertain.

The opposition says it will find the money, by slashing public service spending, including culling public servants, but not front-line

Labor has not yet revealed how it plans to pay for it.

NSA believes that simplifying the pension system, e.g., by Letting Pensioners Work or by creating a Universal Pension, would help to reduce onerous administration costs associated with seniors' interactions with Services Australia and Centrelink.

What to do

If your application is urgent and you are experiencing financial hardship, Centrelink suggests visiting one of its

offices in person.

It's also worth remembering that you can submit your claim up to 13 weeks before you reach the Age Pension age of 67.

If you already get an eligible payment from Centrelink, they will write to you 13 weeks before you reach 67 to tell you how to transfer to the Age Pension.

Update: Delays now even shorter

The Federal Government has announced further reductions in waiting times since this story was originally published in March 2025.

In a media release dated 4 September 2025, Finance Minister, Katy Gallagher, said Services Australia had received almost 4.2 million Medicare and Centrelink claims and over 10 million phone calls between April and June 2025, with extra staff helping to clear backlogs that developed in the wake of the pandemic.

Age Pension claims took an average 32 days in the April-June 2025 guarter. down from 74 in the same period in 2024, while Disability Support Pension claims are now taking average of 34 days, down from 96.

Getting through the wealth plateau



by Phil Harvey For many families, hitting your 40s with a strong income

feels like success. You've worked hard, bought a home, and life is busy with school runs, weekend sport, and the occasional family holiday.

But here's the surprising thing: even with a household income of \$400,000 or more, many families aren't wealthy.

They've reached what I call the wealth plateau. Good disposable income but not building wealth as well as they could

Let's meet one such family... Bandit and Chilli

Bandit (42) earns \$260,000 a year as an IT contractor, while Chilli (40) brings in \$140,000. Together they earn \$400,000. Their Brisbane home is worth \$1.4 million with a \$400,000 mortgage. They've got \$700,000 in super between them, and they can easily manage to put \$5,000 a month into their offset which is a healthy \$120,000. They could increase this to \$10,000 if they tried.

On paper, they look set. But after school fees, family holidays, groceries, and the daily juggle of raising Bluey

(15) and Bingo (9), Bandit and Chilli often feel like they're running hard but standing still.

Why the Wealth Plateau Happens

- 1. Lifestyle creep. As income grows, spending often follows. New cars, more travel, and the best for the kids - all good things, but they eat into wealth-building.
- 2. Focusing only on debt. Paying off the mortgage feels safe, but it doesn't grow wealth by itself.
- 3. Investing too little. With money sitting in cash or offset accounts, families miss out on compounding growth.

This isn't laziness or mismanagement - it's just the natural result of busy, successful family life.

Breaking Through the Plateau

The good news? With discipline and a clear plan, families like Bandit and Chilli can break through the plateau and aim for a \$5 million portfolio (including super) by age 55. Here's how:

Step 1: Define the end goal.

For Bandit and Chilli, it's financial independence at 55 - enough to choose whether to keep working or not. That means building \$3.5m in today's dollars which in 13

years will be about \$5 million. That's more than enough for them to clear the mortgage and provide a tax-free income of \$120,000 a year for life.

Step 2: Put the mortgage in perspective.

At \$300,000, their home loan is manageable. Yes, keep paying it down, but don't let it stop you from investing.

Step 3: Dave and invest consistently

By investing \$5,000 monthly into Exchange Traded Funds held in Chilli's name (and starting with \$100,000 from the offset account) they will be able to retire at 55.

Getting an 8% annual return (and reinvesting it), this will grow into more than \$1.3m in 13 years. This will be more than enough to pay off the rest of the mortgage and have enough left over to fund their lifestyle until they reach 60.

Step 4: Supercharge super.

With \$700,000 already in super, salary sacrificing up to the concessional cap can grow this to over \$2.8m by the time they are 55. Even more if they used the unused concessional contributions this year instead of investing the \$100,000 into

If they were able to save and

make an additional aftertax contribution to super of \$50,000 a year, their super would be worth \$3.8 million in 13 years. Job done!

The Bottom Line

High incomes don't guarantee wealth - intentional strategy does. Bandit and Chilli show that even with swimming lessons, weekend playdates, and family holidays, a \$5m future is within reach for most professionals.

If you're in your 40s, the next decade is your most powerful wealth-building window. Don't



Beyond the scales: New CSIRO study reveals what you really gain from losing weight

CSIRO study shows weight loss linked with higher life satisfaction, better physical and emotional wellbeing, and improved lifestyle.

A new study from CSIRO, Australia's national science agency, has found the benefits of weight loss extend well beyond the scales with nearly 90 per cent of survey respondents who lost over 15kg reporting improved health, wellbeing and energy levels.

With much already known about the clinical risk factors associated with obesity, the study focused on the broader physical, emotional and financial benefits of losing weight through the CSIRO Total Wellbeing Diet.

The survey of 1,300 past and present CSIRO Total Wellbeing Diet Members found that those who achieved greater weight loss reported greater improvements to their quality of life.

Seventy-two per cent of members who lost at least 5kg, reported improvements in their health and satisfaction with life following weight loss success.

Additional benefits commonly reported by members included improved energy levels, body image, mobility, self-confidence, vitality and mood.

Lead researcher, Dr Gilly Hendrie, said the findings highlight the truly holistic impact that weight loss has on people's lives.

"This study shows that weight loss can deliver so much more than a number on a scale," Dr Hendrie said.

"It has the power to transform how people feel, move, live, and even how they spend. The flow-on effect of improved health, mood, and confidence can change someone's whole outlook on life."

Eighty-seven per cent of members living with obesity also reported living with at least one chronic health condition. Management of their condition was found to improve with weight loss.

64% of members with type 2 diabetes reported an improvement in their condition, with 12% reporting they no longer had it

40% of members experienced improvements in their mental health, blood pressure and cholesterol

32% of members managing a chronic condition reported a reduced reliance on medication and associated costs

30% of members reported improvements in chronic pain, osteoporosis, sleep apnoea, and arthritis

Particularly interesting among the findings was the shift in spending away from less healthy choices such as convenience snacks, takeaway, dining out and alcohol

with people spending \$315 less a month. Instead, people reported spending a bit more on healthier choices like groceries and physical exercise, about \$325 a month.

"What's really exciting is seeing how weight loss influences everyday choices, from eating better and getting more active, to investing more on healthier habits," Dr Hendrie said.

"It's a reflection of a lifestyle shift, not just a short-term diet and shows that choosing a healthier lifestyle doesn't have to cost more, it just means spending differently.

"With current estimates putting two in three Australian adults as being overweight or obese, we have so much to gain as a population from supporting Australians to eat well and live fuller lives."


We are planning to redevelop 88 Wallace St and some of the Council Depot site to create a small carpark and a pedestrian link to Wallace Street.

We are planning to redevelop 88 Wallace St and some of the Council Depot site to create a small carpark and a pedestrian link to Wallace St. It would provide greater carparking options for locals and tourists as well as provide some additional community space. This is the first stage of a long-term plan to relocate the Depot and convert the rest of the site into more carparking and new housing blocks.

The works are funded with \$3m under the Australian Government's Investing in our Communities Program, \$1.4m under the NSW Regional Housing Fund and Council Section 94 Contributions.

The current project includes:

- Decontamination and renewal of the 88 Wallace Street site (the site was previously use as a service station and workshop)
- Construction of a small car park (approximately 25 car spaces) on part of 88 Wallace Street and part of Council's existing operations
- Disabled parking
- Single lane access off Duncan Street to the north through the laneway (future expansion will include two-lane access from Ryrie Street)
- Pedestrian access from Wallace Street through the old D&S Motors site
- Maintaining access to the rear of the shops and National Theatre on the laneway
- Public toilets



- New water, sewage, and stormwater infrastructure
- Smart infrastructure such as CCTV, smart lighting, solar panels, EV charging station, free wi-fi and power for events
- Addressing any heritage requirements including repurposing materials with a view to pay tribute to the historical use of the site.

The current project doesn't include design or planning for the future

Donald Bradman's 1946-47 Ashes series cap now on display

An historic cricket cap worn by the world's greatest batsman, Sir Donald Bradman, during the 1946-47 Ashes tour of Australia, has been acquired by the National Museum of Australia in Canberra.

Famously averaging an unbeaten 99.94 runs in Test matches, Bradman captained the Australian team in the 1946-47 series, which was the first to be played between Australia and England after the Second World War.

Cricket had been far from front of mind during the long war years, and the Test series represented something of a return to normality for Australians and ushered in a period of cricketing dominance.

The baggy green cap was acquired by the National Museum for \$438,550, with the support of the Australian Government through the National Cultural Heritage Account, which contributed half of the cost.

Minister for the Arts, the Hon Tony Burke MP, said the purchase safeguards an important piece of our national history for future generations.

"You'd be hard-pressed to meet an Australian that hasn't heard of the great Donald Bradman, arguably the greatest cricketer of all time.

"Now to have one of his iconic baggy greens in the National Museum of Australia means visitors will have the opportunity to get up close and connect with our sporting and cultural history."

National Museum director, Katherine McMahon, thanked the Australian Government for its financial support to purchase this iconic piece of Australian cricket history.

"Sir Donald's baggy green marks the life of Australia's most celebrated batsman and reflects a time when sporting heroes gave Australians hope, following the heartbreak and hardship of the Second World War.

"We are delighted this national treasure has found a home here at the National Museum of Australia for all Australians to enjoy," Ms

McMahon said.

The cap will go into the Museum's National Historical Collection and is one of just 11 Bradman baggy greens known to exist. The cap will be on display in the Museum's recently reopened Landmarks gallery, which explores the

moments and objects that help define the nation's history from 1770 to the present day.

The baggy green will sit alongside other Bradman memorabilia at the Museum including an autographed bat from the first Test Match at Trent Bridge, Nottingham, during

the 1934 Ashes series won by Australia, and the ball bowled by First Nations cricketer Eddie Gilbert (Kanju) when he dismissed Bradman for a duck in a Sheffield Shield match in 1931.
