Expressions of Interest to join the Rates Structure Review Panel are now open.

We are looking for community members to join a Community Reference Panel who will provide feedback and advice to Council on a rates structure review.

The Panel will have an advisory role and will recommend a preferred rating structure for consideration by Council and the broader community.

The commitment from the panel is to receive briefing information about how Council distributes the rates burden across ratepayers in the local government area, attend 2-3 workshops, and contribute to ideas with other members of the community in February-March

Council staff will provide comprehensive information, be available to respond to questions, and facilitate the workshops so that all voices are heard. A briefing paper will be available on this page shortly.

Council will listen to the advice of the reference panel before making a decision on setting the rates for the 2026-27 Operational Plan.

Panel members will be selected through this expression of interest process. Panel members will represent a range of ratepayer groups including business, residential and farmland ratepayers and be from across the local government area.

Prospective panel members may attend a briefing workshop to understand more about the rates review process and what will be required in the week of 1-5 December in Bungendore. For those who express their interest after these dates, the briefing information will be provided electronically via email. All information will be available publicly and remain available up until the workshops begin in February 2026.

Members of the panel will workshop with Council staff during February and March 2026.

Mango & Chilli Glazed Ham

Serves: 12 Preparation Time: 70 minutes Difficulty: Easy

Ingredients

Half leg ham, approx 5kg 1 cup chilli jam 4 ripe mangoes, stoned, peeled and chopped

1 lime, juiced and zested

2 tbsp dark rum (optional)

1 ½ cups macadamias, chopped

Method:

1. To make the glaze, place chilli jam, mango, lime juice, zest and rum in a food processor. Season and process until smooth. Stir through macadamias. Set aside.

2. Preheat oven to 170°C (150°C fan-forced). Remove skin from ham, carefully leaving a layer of fat. Using a sharp paring knife, slice a diamond pattern into the fat, taking care not to go too deep.

3. Place ham in a large roasting tray. Glaze hock with foil and brush ham generously with the glaze.

Cook for 1 hour, basting every
 mins. Once caramelised,
 remove from oven and let rest.
 Serve warm or cold with any extra glaze on the side.

Everyone has a story regarding a Cancer of some form and Skin Cancer is no different. Australia is ranked Number 1, along with New Zealand, for Melanoma diagnosis, and yet the most popular thing to do on a hot summer day is to get a tan. This rating of Number 1 is not something that we should be proud of.

The Community Bank branches of Bungendore and Braidwood have partnered with the Australian Skin Cancer Foundation (ASCF) to have the Skin Check Truck visit their towns a second time to provide free on-site skin checks. The dates are as follows:

Changes to parking time limits -Crawford Street, Queanbeyan

Council has made changes to the short-term on-street parking time limits on Crawford Street, Queanbeyan between Morisset and Monaro Streets, and on Fallick

The changes will encourage turnover to help businesses in the area. The changes will be in place while the development at 202 Crawford Street is under construction and then will be reviewed.

The 1-hour time limits have been replaced with a mixture of 1-hour, 30-minute and 15-minute time limits. A small 15-minute parking zone in Fallick Lane has been replaced with a loading zone.

Until the end of the year, parking rangers will be monitoring the area but will not issue fines unless the vehicle has already received a prior warning.

If you need to park for a longer period, there is 3-hour and untimed parking on the edges of the CBD including in Council car parks -Morisset Car Park, Crawford Car Park, Rutledge Car Park, Lowe Car Park, and Collett Car Park.

BreastScreen NSW expands machine reading to all women following a successful roll out

Following the successful rollout of machine reading technology 12 months ago, BreastScreen NSW is expanding use to include mammography images of all first-time screeners.

The technology - initially used to read selected images from women aged 50-59 - has significantly reduced call backs for further tests, reducing stress for women, without compromising cancer detection rates.

By the end of 2025, it's predicted that as a direct result of the technology's accuracy, around 500, or 20 per cent fewer women, will be asked to return for additional tests, which can include a breast

ultrasound and a needle biopsy.

Since the technology was introduced, it's read more than 19,000 images and detected more than 130 cancers.

Donna, who was diagnosed with breast cancer aged 60 years said, "Breast cancer has been a big part of my family's story. My younger sister was diagnosed in 2006 and my elder sister was diagnosed in 2012. Given our family history I made sure to have regular breast screens. And it's a good thing I did because in 2016 it was my turn."

"Fortunately my cancer was caught through a breast screen early and now I tell everyone if the BreastScreen NSW bus comes to your area go get checked. You don't have to go alone take a friend. The first time can be a bit of a shock but after that it just becomes routine something you do for your health and your life."

BreastScreen NSW was Australia's first population-based screening program to introduce the cutting-edge technology to support radiologists in interpreting a select range of mammography images.

At least one radiologist continues to read every woman's image to look for the early stages of breast cancer, with machine reading technology providing additional analysis.

The technology is ensuring

BreastScreen NSW can continue to deliver a world class service, while meeting the needs of NSW's growing population.

Successfully used in similar international population-based screening programs, BreastScreen NSW undertook a world-first study to extensively evaluate the accuracy and efficacy of this new technology prior to its implementation.

The study showed the technology produced comparable results to the existing screening program, without compromising cancer detection rates.

For women aged 50-74, a breast screen every two years is the

best way to detect breast cancer early - before it can be seen or felt. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women are recommended to screen from age 40.

Early detection not only significantly increases a person's chance of survival, it can also greatly reduce the need for invasive treatment like a mastectomy.

Any woman who has noticed a change in their breasts, like a lump, should see their doctor without delay.

Producers urged to get in quick before eID Tag Discount wraps up

NSW Producers are being reminded to utilise the Sheep and Goat eID Tag Discount before the program concludes on December 31.

The program provides a discount of \$0.76 each (incl GST) for 2025 NLIS-accredited white elD devices when purchased from a retailer or manufacturer between 1 November 2024 to 31 December 2025 (or until funds are exhausted) and includes elD tags

and leg bands.

The program has seen a strong uptake of eID tags, with appoximately 15 million eID tags purchased since November 2024, nearly 1.8 million eIDs scanned in saleyards in 2025 so far and approximately 22.4% of the sheep and goats coming through saleyards already equipped with an eID device.

Since 1 January, all NSW saleyards have been required to

scan electronic identification (eID) devices for sheep and goats and producers have been required to attach eID tags to any lambs or kids born after that date before they are moved.

Processors, saleyards, agents and producers have benefited from a diverse range of support activities from the NSW Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development Sheep & Goat eID implementation team.

Since January 2023, extension staff have interacted with over 24000 stakeholders at 1295 industry events in 240 locations across the state, launched online and in-person training workshops, and developed stories showcasing the real-world application of eID on NSW farms.

The eID program is essential in strengthening the integrity of the state's livestock traceability system and represents a

significant step forward in biosecurity and livestock management for the NSW sheep and goat industry.

How much do you need to retire?



by Phil Harvey

Knowing how much people need to retire is one of the biggest questions a lot of

people will face.

The good news is it is pretty easy to work out. The bad news is there isn't a simple answer, as everyone's idea of a comfortable retirement is different.

For a single person they might need somewhere between \$50,000 and \$80,000 and a couple might need between \$75,000 and \$150.000

The rule of thumb is for every \$10,000 dollars a year you want to spend in retirement, you need around \$230,000 in investments (for the purposes of this, ignore whether this is in super or not).

While this is useful, it is also a bit misleading, as it doesn't factor in things like the age pension or how your expenses will change (ie reduce) over time.

If you followed the rule of thumb and worked until you had \$2.3 million invested, you could safely retire at 60 and draw \$100,000 of the investment for the rest of your

Assuming you were invested in a range of investments that gave a long-term return of 8%:

- · You would have an 85% chance of never running out of money. A comforting result.
- You would have a 60% chance of having the equivalent amount of money to when you retired. Retire with confidence.
- You would have a 40% chance of having twice as much money as when you retired. Great result, especially for your kids!

With the age pension

Now, if this same couple wanted \$100,000 a year and factored in the age pension, they could

retire when they had \$1.7 million in investments. This could mean they were able to retire 3-4 years sooner than they thought possible.

Changing expenses

Generally, our peak spending years are between the ages of 30 and 60. No surprise, especially if there are kids involved.

Once people retire, they tend to spend less than when they were working. From 60-70 it decreases slightly, but beyond 70 it falls about 3% a year.

If this couple factored in that they were going to start spending \$100,000 a year but acknowledge it would not increase in line with inflation every year, they could retire on around \$1.2 million and still never run out of money.

Let's take this one step further for those that desperately want to retire earlier. If the expenses were reduced to \$75,000 (and didn't increase in line with inflation) and

the age pension was factored into it, you could retire with about \$700,000 invested and not run out of money.

This is good news, because the most recent data shows that the average 60-year-old couple have around \$700,000 in their super. In other words, for the average 60-year-old couple it is easily attainable to have a comfortable retirement with what you already

My Aged Care in seriousness need of an overhaul following independent review

The Inspector-General of Aged Care's final report of its Review of My Aged Care has exposed significant flaws and inadequacies with the platform designed to be the single-entry point to the aged care system.

The review found that My Aged Care is onerously complex to navigate and not tailored to the needs of older people; it is poorly understood due to a lack of awareness; the delivery model is not fit-for-purpose; and there is a lack of equity backgrounds or complex needs.

Older Persons Advocacy Network (OPAN) CEO Craig Gear said the findings are not surprising given what we consistently hear from older people, with My Aged Care in need of an overhaul.

"The report's message is clear - My Aged Care is failing too many older people, who are left unable to navigate and access the support they need, when

for older people from diverse they need it," Mr Gear said. complying with voluntary

"My Aged Care is meant to be the front door to the aged care system, but many older people are unable to find the front door or to step their way through it.

"Aged care is very complex and older people deserve user friendly and easy to navigate pathways including in person access points.

"OPAN was pleased to participate in the consultations for the review, which included requests for anonymised data and information from our systems, which demonstrated the challenges faced by older people in navigating My Aged Care. This was the first use of the Inspector-General of Aged Care's information

request powers.

diverse backgrounds and in the new Act. Regardless, remote locations. Greater investment and commitment are needed to achieve an accessible system.

"OPAN welcomes the report's recommendations, which includes improving public awareness, reducing system complexity and enabling equitable access to aged care.

"We acknowledge some changes have been made to the My Aged Care website with the commencement of

older people are still reporting difficulties in locating providers on the website as well as the ability to compare pricing.

"Older people deserve to be treated with dignity and respect. Reforming My Aged Care would be a positive step in achieving that."

White hair syndrome - when you're the last customer served



National Seniors Australia

A new NSA research report reveals your experiences of ageist treatment in shops, cafes, and bars.

It is a generally accepted fact that when we head out on the town to spend on goods or services, we want to have a fun time and be treated with respect.

Whether we are buying a coffee or a new fridge, none of us want to face patronising attitudes and backs turned against us.

Yet that has been the experience of many older Australians as customers in retail and hospitality venues.

National Seniors Australia's latest research report, Experiences of Ageism in Retail and Hospitality, showcases written comments by 130+ Australians aged 50 or older about being ignored or poorly treated as customers in shops, bars, and cafes.

The comments were written in response to a question in the 2024 National Seniors Social Survey, in which older Australians were asked whether they had experienced exclusion or discrimination based on their age.

The 1000+ people who said 'yes' described many and varied forms of discrimination and exclusion, which we fully reviewed in our 2025 report on the question, Elements of Ageism 4: Experiences of Exclusion and Discrimination.

But people's experiences in retail and hospitality settings stood out as worthy of special attention.

This is an under-appreciated form of ageist exclusion that needs to be addressed.

We therefore created this targeted report so that people in the retail and hospitality industries can read about the problem in older Australians' own words.

Not a trivial problem

The consequences of ignoring an older customer or serving them last may seem small to the person doing it. Being left behind happens to us all once in a while, as upsetting or infuriating as it may be.

But when it happens repeatedly, it is debilitating to the person on the receiving

The report reproduces all 130+ comments we received on this topic, to help readers get a sense of its prevalence and what it is like to experience the same thing over and over.

Feeling invisible is a common experience. Comments included:

"Sometimes in stores, shop attendants ignore you as if you are not there."

"I feel like I'm invisible at times, especially in restaurants. I often joke that it's a good time to rob a bank as no-one sees me!"

"In cafes and restaurants have had the experience of being overlooked or forgotten about. I tell my children it is my new superpower, invisibility."

When customers are queuing, older people are often served last.

"Sometimes when there are younger ones being served ahead, even when I have been waiting longer."

"Often when shopping/lining up, you are passed over for a younger customer."

"I call it the 'white hair syndrome'. Often the older person is left waiting while others are served."

Some commenters told us that if they were out shopping with a younger person, customer service staff would often speak to them instead:

"Salespeople have addressed my daughter rather than me, despite the fact that I am the purchaser."

"I have the double-whammy of my assumed older age and being in a wheelchair, so often in a restaurant, cafe, or other retail environment, the assistant will refer/speak to my companion and totally disregard me, often not even looking at me."

At times the service is actively bad, beyond ignoring older

customers:

"I have been treated as if I was an old nuisance by some workers in the deli section of a shop."

"Often get treated by young service providers with disdain. Being almost shouted at when I ask someone to repeat what they said."

Calling out ageism

When this kind of exclusion happens more to older people than younger people, it is clearly ageism - a pattern of discriminatory behaviour based on age. It is illegal. Treating someone differently because of their age contravenes the Age Discrimination Act 2004, whether in customer service or anywhere else.

If a shop or food outlet discriminates against you because of your age, let them know through their customer review channels, including social media. Even send a copy or link to this report if possible! Sometimes people are unaware their attitudes or actions are ageist until it is pointed out to them.

By the same token, if you feel that a business has done a great job of being inclusive towards older people, give them positive feedback so they keep doing it.

It's to businesses' advantage to improve their game. Ageist attitudes are not just bad for customers, they're also bad for business.

People who experience ageist service often do not come back and do not spend their money at that business again.

As one person wrote:

"Often excluded from service in shops - if this happens, I don't use the service again - their loss as I have the means to employ them."

Captains Flat and Bungendore.


Not only will the program make travelling with an EV much more convenient, but it supports local regional economies as more EV drivers stop to explore and spend time in communities while they recharge.



New free toolkit helps Australians manage their money and support their mental health this festive season

With the festive season approaching and cost-of-living pressures continuing to affect households across the country, Beyond Blue and Financial Counselling Australia have launched a new free resource to help people manage their finances and look after their mental health.

The Money and Mental Health Toolkit includes practical tips for managing thoughts and emotions, budgeting, having conversations with banks or utility companies and finding the right support when you need it.

Its launch comes as demand for financial support via the National Debt Helpline phone service remains high, with almost 170,000 calls and chats in the 12 months to the end of October.

Recent results from Beyond Blue's Australia's Mental Health and Wellbeing Check found financial pressure was the leading cause of distress for nearly half (46%) of all respondents.

Beyond Blue CEO Georgie Harman AO said the festive season could be a particularly challenging time for many people, when financial and emotional pressures often intensified.

"There are so many expectations around this season and that can bring added pressure, especially when money is tight," she said.

"Financial stress and mental health are closely connected.

"Financial stress can affect how people feel, think and act. It can lead to sleep issues, relationship strain, and a sense of hopelessness. But it also works the other way - when someone's mental health is impacted, it becomes harder to manage money, make decisions, or seek support. It's a two-way relationship."

Financial Counselling Australia CEO Dr Domenique Meyrick said the Toolkit was a timely and practical resource for people who may be feeling overwhelmed.

"Financial stress can be isolating. People often feel ashamed or unsure about where to turn. The Toolkit offers a starting point - it's about helping people take small steps, reflect on their situation, and feel more confident reaching out for support.

"Silence and avoidance are common reactions to financial stress, but they can make things feel even more overwhelming. Financial counselling through the National Debt Helpline is free and confidential, and it can make a real difference. We want people to know they're not alone and that support is available."

Beyond Blue speaker Megan Barrow knows what it's like to have financial stress impact her mental health.

The 54-year-old Melbourne woman and small business owner has lived experience of depression, PTSD, anxiety and agoraphobia. Ten years ago, she faced a difficult period trying to manage her mortgage alone.

"I became overwhelmed and started to sink backwards in my finances - going deeper and deeper into debt," Ms Barrow said

"This fed into my mental health, and I started to spiral. I lost all hope and couldn't see a way

With encouragement from her mum, Ms Barrow contacted her bank and asked for financial assistance.

"I was incredibly nervous and embarrassed, but I discovered people were there to help," she said.

"The weight of the world lifted off my shoulders and I could work on both my finances and mental wellbeing. It took a while to get back onto my feet, but I did."

The Money and Mental Health Toolkit is the latest in a series of resources produced by Beyond Blue and Financial Counselling Australia, including the Money and Mental Health Quiz - a five-minute online tool that helps individuals reflect on how financial stress may be affecting their mental health and directs them to useful resources. Since its launch last November, more than 11,500 people have completed the quiz, with 74% falling into the 'struggling' or 'critical' categories, indicating high levels of financial stress and mental health symptoms like feelings of defeat, exhaustion, anxiety, and hopelessness

Ms Harman encouraged those experiencing distress not to wait.

"We talk a lot about downward spirals, but upward spirals are possible too. Small steps in the right direction can lead to big changes over time," she said.

"You don't have to wait until things feel unmanageable. Taking that first step can help you feel more in control, whether it's visiting our website and downloading the Money and Mental Health Toolkit, or calling the Beyond Blue Support Service or the National Debt Helpline.

"There's always a way forward. Talking to someone can help lighten the load and give you hope that you can get through this."

Innovation changing the way we manage bushfire risk

As bushfire seasons become longer and more unpredictable, Essential Energy is turning to new technology and research partnerships to help manage the risks communities face across regional, rural and remote New South Wales. Once an anomaly but now a regular part of life, storms, floods, fires and extreme weather events have challenged networks to evolve their approach to keep the network safer and more reliable.

Advanced bushfire risk modelling, developed in partnership with the University of Melbourne and electricity networks across New South Wales, gives us a far clearer picture of where bushfire danger lies, according to Essential Energy's Network Risk Strategy Manager, lan Fitzpatrick.

"This technology brings together data on past bushfire events, weather patterns, vegetation and network characteristics to estimate not only where a fire is most likely to start, but what the impact could be on people, property and the environment if it spreads."

"So far, thanks to this technology, we've been able to pinpoint how the fire risk varies across our vast network," lan says.

For example, along the Mid North Coast, where the natural

environment is dense, our models show the bushfire risk is higher than before. However, our learnings allow our teams and crews to target the areas where work is needed most - trimming vegetation and repairing assets before the summer heat turns small hazards into bigger problems.

Beyond the modelling, it's important we're able to take a closer look at the network, which is being made more efficient due to our evolving drone and helicopter fleet. Where previously low flying small planes were used, drones and helicopter mounted cameras are now at the forefront, providing sharper, more detailed views in more areas across the network.

Essential Energy is also trialling artificial intelligence (AI) to review inspection photos, speeding up defect identification and enabling faster response times. In addition, new pole mounted sensors called Early Fault Detection (EFD's) are being installed to alert for emerging faults. This technology means we can move from simply finding problems to fixing them sooner, reducing bushfire risk and improving reliability for communities.

Looking ahead, we will continue to invest in new technology and

build on our partnerships locally, statewide and internationally to improve the safety and reliability of the network for our communities. By working with all NSW electricity networks and drawing on the expertise of the University of Melbourne, we're ensuring a consistent, best-practice approach to bushfire risk. Our team also collaborates through national and international forums like Energy Networks Australia (ENA) and the International Wildfire Risk Mitigation Consortium (IWRMC).

"Collaboration is key to tackling bushfire risk. Our network stretches across some of the most diverse and challenging landscapes in New South Wales. With bushfire seasons growing longer and extreme weather events becoming more frequent, we can't rely on old ways of working. By sharing knowledge and harnessing new technology, every year we're improving how we manage risk and improve resilience across the network," lan says.






Venn Diagram






